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

A CHRISTMAS MESSAGE

The feast of the Nativity of our Lord is upon us. Soon we will gather in the Church on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day to celebrate this glorious feast. Yet, year after year we find ourselves poorly prepared for this celebration. So what I want to ask all of you is this; "ARE YOU READY FOR CHRISTMAS?"

Normally when this question is asked we can point to a number of things that would get us ready for Christmas. Do we have our tree out and decorated? Are all the decorations and lights hung? Is our shopping completed? Did we send our Christmas Cards? Did we wrap all the presents? Did we buy enough food and drinks for the Holiday? Did we invite all the family and friends? It's like in everything we do there is always the stage of level of preparation. I'm sure everyone has a list like the one mentioned above, and like a good manager we check off the list as we go on. However, this is not what I am referring to when I asked this

question? "ARE YOU READY FOR CHRISTMAS?" I am referring to the spiritual aspects of the season not the entertaining aspect. In human terms, we are so prepared in our lives to accept this Holiday season as a way to entertain ourselves with material things instead of concentrating on the real issue here. It's great to have a good time, with family over for dinner, being generous with our decorations, with the different variety of foods that your family will enjoy this Holiday season. So much to see, so much to do in just a short time. But we are forgetting something very important that this whole Holiday season is about one person, and that is celebrating the Birth of our Lord Jesus Christ. Did that ever cross your mind? Remember the word Christmas - it has the name of Christ, "who is with us." If you wanted to translate this word in Greek it means the "Birth of Christ."

So this so called Christmas Holiday is not all about us, but it is about Christ. It is His birthday that we are celebrating and not for our own selfish convenience. When John the Baptist came into the picture he gave a message to all the people. He said "We need to get ready for the coming Messiah." He didn't say get ready to have a good time with family and friends. John the Baptist preaching in the desert of Judea said "Repent for the Kingdom of heaven is near." This is He who was spoken of through the prophet Isaiah. A voice of one calling in the wilderness, "Prepare the way of the Lord, and make straight paths for Him." But people today even Christians when asked "Are you ready for Christmas?", they immediately think about the Christmas tree, the lights and decorations, the shopping for gifts, and other non essential items that have nothing to do with this serious question? This question refers to, "Are you producing the right fruit in keeping with the word repentance?" To define the word repentance, it means that we need to change our ways, in order to keep from making the same mistakes that we do year after year. We have gotten ourselves into a constant maze that we can't get out of. We think Christmas is to bring excitement and pleasure for ourselves. If you think like that then you are not

truly celebrating Christmas in the right way. If we read in Galatians 5: "True confession and repentance leads to love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, faithfulness, and self control flowing out of our lives."

How many of you have ever met a person who called himself a Christian and yet was mean, bitter, unhappy, and unpleasant. Have we forgotten that Christmas is not primarily about us, our family, friends, and buying presents. BUT IT IS ABOUT CHRIST? Isn't it easy to get wrapped up in the celebration that we forgot what it is we are supposed to be celebrating. We teach our children every year about Santa Claus, about presents under the tree, about reindeers and having a good time, but we forget what our true purpose of what Christmas is all about. It's about being with Jesus on His birthday. We have birthday parties for our children, our parents, our relatives and friends, and we always find the time to share the beautiful moments together. But when the Lord's birthday comes every year most of us are never there to worship Him and to thank Him for all the great things that are happening in our lives. We like receiving the great gifts and blessings that the Lord gives to us, but we never repay Him with our presence at His home on Christmas Eve and Christmas day. Yes, we can all give the excuse that the Christmas season is extremely busy, filled with much care and running around to get everything that we need in order. But often not with much thought for the One whose birth we will be celebrating on the 25th of December.

Let us use this time and date wisely, concentrating on what we are going to give to Christ on Christmas day. He doesn't want your wealth, but He would love it very much if we would come to Church with our family and give Him the greatest present meaning "You." Let's not forget that the Advent period is a reminder that this feast is about a spiritual reality. Let us make an effort by coming to Church on Christmas Eve, or Christmas Day preparing to receive Holy Communion with your family members. This is what Christmas is all about. It's not about us. It's about Christ.

God Bless everyone, and may you have a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

The Nativity of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ in the Flesh December 25

Introduction

The Feast of the Nativity of Jesus is one of the most joyful days of the Orthodox Church. It ranks next to the greatest holiday, the Resurrection of Jesus. The Feast of the Birth of Iesus is also known as the "Incarnation of Christ." This means that Jesus became a man and came into the world to save us. We also refer to this joyous feast as Christmas.

BIBLICAL STORY

The story of the Nativity of Christ is beautifully told in the Holy Scriptures. The story is found in Matthew 1:18-25 and in Luke 2:1-20. No matter how often the Birth of Jesus is told, we realize that it is an important event.

As the story is told by the Apostles, the Roman Empire was powerful. The Romans had conquered much of the then known world. Judea and Samaria, what we know today as Israel, were included in their conquests. Emperor Augustus ordered that a census be taken in all his lands. He needed to know how many people lived in the empire so he could tax them. Everyone had to go to the town of their family's origin to register for the census. This meant that Mary and Joseph had to go to Bethlehem. They were descendants of King David and Bethlehem was the City of David.

Mary and Joseph lived in Nazareth and it was a great distance from Bethlehem. It was about 100 miles over very rugged roads. Moreover, Mary was expecting the baby and it was almost time for her to give birth. Bethlehem was a small town and there were many descendants of David who had come to register for the census. By the time Mary and Joseph arrived in Bethlehem there was no place for them to stay. Joseph tried very hard to find a place to sleep that evening. There was no room at the inn. Finally, Joseph found a cave-like place where they could rest. This place was used by shepherds to protect their sheep in stormy weather. It was here that Mary gave birth to Jesus. The baby was wrapped in swaddling clothes and laid in the straw in the manger.

Now, that night the shepherds were out in the fields guarding their sheep. Suddenly, there was a bright light which startled the shepherds. The light was so bright that it turned the night into daylight. Of course, the shepherds were frightened. Nothing such as this had ever happened. Soon an angel appeared and calmed them. The angel said:

"Fear not for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior; which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you: You shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger" (Luke 2:11-12).

Then a larger group of angels appeared. They praised and glorified God and sang, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, and good will toward men" (Luke 2:14). When the angels finished singing, they disappeared and the light began to fade. It became dimmer and dimmer until it was dark again. The shepherds were awed. They didn't know what to do. Finally, they decided to leave their flocks of sheep and go to Bethlehem. They decided that they wanted to see for themselves what the angels had told them. When they got to Bethlehem, they found Mary, Joseph, and the infant Jesus. They fell to their knees and adored Jesus.

Some Wise Men came from the East for they knew of the coming of Jesus. They had seen a star that told them that a new king had been born to the Jews. They followed the star and were looking for the child. At this time the governor of Judea was King Herod. He was a wicked man and was feared and hated by the people. When Herod heard about the Wise Men looking for the child, he invited them to his palace. Herod asked the Wise Men to find the child so that he, too, could worship Him. But Herod was lying. He did not want anyone to take his place. The Wise Men went on to look for Jesus. The Star led them to Jesus and Mary. When the Wise Men found Jesus, they fell to their knees and worshipped Him. They gave Jesus gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. The Wise Men left but did not return to Herod. They had a dream that warned them that Herod wanted to harm Jesus. Instead, they returned to their native country by a different route.

ICON OF THE FEAST

The icon of the Nativity tells the story of Christ's birth from the Scriptures. It also shows that all creation is taking part in Christ's birth. The angels give thanks with their song; the heavens give the star; the Wise Men give their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. The poor, humble shepherds give their praise and amazement; the earth gives the cave, and humanity gives the Virgin.

This Holy Icon is an icon with many scenes. First, it stresses the importance of the Theotokos, the Mother of Jesus. She is placed in the center and is the largest figure in the icon. In this icon, she is

kneeling with crossed arms, looking at the Christ child. The three stars, denoting her virginity before, during, and after the Nativity, are on her garments. The Christ Child, in the center of the icon, is in swaddling clothes and is lying in the manger. In the background is the dark cave where He was born. In the cave are an ox and a donkey guarding the newborn Babe. Even though the Gospels say nothing of the cave, this information is from Holy Tradition. Neither do the Gospels speak of the ox and the donkey, but all icons of the Nativity include these animals. Including the animals in the icon fulfills the prophecy of Isaiah 1:3, "The ox knows his master, and the donkey his master's crib; but Israel does not know me, and the people have not regarded me." The long ray of light from the star points directly to the cave. This ray comes from the star and travels to all parts of the world. It teaches that this bright star is an astronomical happening, and is a messenger from heaven announcing the birth of Jesus.

On the left hand side of the icon is another scene. The Wise Men, who were led by the star, are riding horses to bring their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh to Jesus. The Wise Men are of various ages. One is without a beard. In those days, young men did not wear beards. The other Wise Man has long hair and a long beard, which indicates that he is much older. These details teach that regardless of age and appearance, the Good News was given to each and everyone.

Opposite the Wise Men is the scene with the humble shepherds. An angel proclaims the glad tidings. A young shepherd plays a reed instrument. This scene reveals that the music of the humans was added to the hymn of the angels. Across from the shepherd's scene is the heavenly choir of angels. They are giving glory to God. The angels serve two purposes in the Nativity of Christ. They give glory to God and announce the good news to all mankind.

The background shows a very rugged terrain. This is not a true representation of

the land in this area. Joseph could not find room in Bethlehem, so they went outside of Bethlehem to a cave. This rocky mountain formation only serves as a background for the event.

In the lower part of the icon are two more scenes. In the right hand corner are the two women Joseph brought to take care of the Christ child. They are bathing Him just as any baby is bathed. The humanity of Jesus is clearly shown in this setting.

Opposite the bathing of Jesus scene sits a sad and worried Joseph. He is not part of the central group the Christ Child and the Theotokos. Joseph is not the natural father. Joseph is troubled and despondent. There is an old man talking to Joseph. The old man is Satan. Satan can appear in many forms. Here he is as an old man who is tempting Joseph and disturbing him. Satan is telling Joseph that virgin birth is impossible. He's telling Joseph that he's a fool if he believes this. This story comes to us from Holy Tradition. The sad Joseph shows us not only his personal predicament but the dilemma of all mankind the difficulty of accepting that which is "beyond words or reason."

The tree, which is in the middle of the lower part of the icon, is a symbol of the Tree of Jesse. This tree refers to Isaiah 11:1-2, "But a shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse, and from his roots a bud shall blossom. The spirit of the Lord shall rest upon Him." King David was often mentioned as the son of Jesse and Jesus was from the House of David.

The Holy Icon of the Nativity reminds one to praise and glorify the Birth of Christ. The celebration of Christmas each year serves to remind each and everyone of us that Christ came for you and me.

THE ORTHODOX CELEBRATION OF THE FEAST OF THE NATIVITY

As with Pascha, or Easter, the Feast of the Nativity begins with a period of preparation. It is proceeded by a fast corresponding to Lent and lasting for forty days. The fast begins on November 15.

On the Sundays immediately before December 25, special commemorations emphasize the link between the Old Covenant and the New. On December 20 the Forefeast of the Nativity is commemorated, and the daily liturgical texts are directed toward the Feast itself. On Christmas Eve, services include the Great or Royal Hours, the Great Vespers, and the Liturgy of Saint Basil.

On Christmas Day the service commemorates the birth of Christ in Bethlehem, the adoration of the Shepherds, and the arrival of the Wise Men with their gifts. The service held on this day is the Liturgy of Saint John Chrysostom.

The days following Christmas are associated with the Theotokos and Joseph. December 26 is the Synaxis of the Mother of God, and the first Sunday after the Feast commemorates "Joseph the Betrothed." December 29 commemorates the Massacre of the Innocents, and January 1 the Circumcision of our Lord. The Nativity season concludes on December 31, but the spirit of the festival extends to the celebration of Theophany (Epiphany), the feast commemorating the Baptism of our Lord in the Jordan River.





HOW DO WE PREPARE FOR CHRISTMAS

This is the time of the year when everyone starts getting ready for Christmas. The stores are packed with people buying gifts. The houses are decorated with light and trimmings, and yards become the showcase of Christmas splendor. And yet, we still don't have any idea what Christmas really means. We do not tremble when we think of Christmas, we are not always struck with the wonder of Christ's Birth. Instead, we buy gifts, and plan parties, catching a glimpse of the joy of the Feast but without a heart immersed in it's wonder.

All these preparations are a wonderful expression of emotions, but how does God want us to prepare ourselves for Christmas. We have gone away from the true essence of why we celebrate the Birth of our Lord. An essential part of preparing for Christmas involves re-arranging. Just as we arranged our homes, schedules and other aspects of our daily lives. God would like us to focus on what Christmas is all about. It's not about fun and entertainment. It's not about going to a party or a bar and getting entoxicated. It's not about going to the Department stores and buying expensive gifts for your family and friends. Christmas is about Christ.

We see the struggles that people face day to day to preserve the Christmas Spirit. Look at the unemployment rate in this country. People are loosing their jobs, their homes, and their livelihood. People are borrowing money that they can't repay. The prisons are filled with inmates that tried to beat the system and failed. Our Political system and Government are failing us. They have gotten us into so much debt, that our children and grandchildren will be suffering for years to come to pay the enormous debt that they have put us through. But what can we do as simple people to correct this problem.

The answer to this question is quite simple. We must make sacrifices and personal decisions that will correct the past mistakes.. If we put Christ "First" in our lives then, everything will work out allright and our spirit will surely be filled with love and hope. Once we cleanse ourselves and accept Christ as our true Saviour, then you will see many things that will change in our lives. As Christians, we need to get back to the basics and the old times where Christ came first in our lives. Today, we have Him on the back burner. Think of Christmas as a Holy Day, where we can make this day a special day in our lives. Let's change the usual way we celebrate Christmas, and reflect on a special receipe that I will perscribe.

If you follow this receipe this will bring happiness, peace, and love to everyone. Ther are 4 things to this receipe.

- No. 1 FASTING: During this period of the Nativity Fast, it is a period of preparation for our souls and bodies. It's benefits are enormous. It is a blessed tool that brings us closer to our self awarness and self evaluation. It opens our eyes to show us who we really are, and where we are heading. It is the key that will open the door to our spiritual destination.
- No. 2 PRAYER: By using this method, prayer is a weapon that releives all the stress, and pressures of this world. Prayer gives us the inner spiritual strength to battle the problems that we face daily. Prayer is a vessel of communication that links us to God and others. And it also brings peace to our souls and minds.
- No. 3: FORGIVENESS: This is the weapon that beats Satan at his game, and delivers us back to God refreshed and renewed. If we could put a steady diet of this spiritual receipe in our daily experiences, then we have a good chance to get back to the reality of what Christmas truly is.



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






stewardship letter

Dear Parishioner:



We are on the last leg of 2023, and before we realize it, the new year of 2024 will be upon us. As we enter into another productive year, we cannot afford to rest on our laurels. As a community we have a lot of work to do, the groundwork has been started, and we must work even harder to promote a better Christian environment for ourselves and our children. God has blessed our community with parishioners like you, who have supported the church throughout the years. But to continue this success that we have experienced, we need to focus on something very important. We need to understand what "STEWARDSHIP" means.

Our main concern in writing this letter is to have a better communication with the members of our St. Demetrios family. Somewhere down the line we have forgotten what it means to be a Good Standing Member of the Church. 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How do we find Christ? How can we change the way we live to come closer to God?

Summer is over and we are in the fall season. Days will get shorter and the nights longer. There will be more darkness than light. But you and I know that Christ is the Light of the world and therefore we are not afraid of darkness.

One local Orthodox priest in his sermon said: "In the first centuries of Christianity, in times of persecution, the faithful prayed in the catacombs, hidden in the damp underground. Faithful Christians came to these catacombs to offer prayers despite the darkness, dampness, and frightful cold, away from their persecutors. If we are going to share and to bask in that light, we need to pay more attention to our spiritual lives.

Today in our churches, we have the right to pray and to exercise our religious freedom. We are able to peacefully sing hymns of praise, to discuss openly the issues of our faith and to partake freely of the Holy Sacraments of the Church. We are certainly taking good care of our physical lives and well being, but as a society we are also neglecting our spiritual well being.

What can this empty, sinful world give back to us? There is nothing more beautiful or perfect than God. The Word of Truth is in the church in the world outside of God we find emptiness, as well as dissension, hate, and instability. In the Christian world we find tenderness, truth, love and joy; which is real and stable at all times. Through Christ and the Church, we find the true oasis for our souls.

The question is always asked: "How do we find Christ?" "How can we change the way we live to come closer to God?"

The answer is very easy! We need to pray more and fast more. The other day I heard someone say, I don't believe in fasting, nor do I believe that we must pray in order to be better Christians. That you don't believe in what our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ teaches us? In today's society, we like to pick and choose what we like or dislike about Christ's teachings. There is a tendency with people today to mold Christ into what we think He should be. Christ will always be the same yesterday, today and tomorrow. We cannot change Him to fit our ideas.

The value of wisdom is another important ingredient that we could use as a weapon to armor ourselves. Where do we find this wisdom? By reading the Holy Bible? The Holy Bible is filled with the wisdom of God. The church is filled with the wisdom of God. When society or even our own members go elsewhere to look for something more meaningful and substantive, it is often due to two things. First, whether we have failed as a church, and second, people's lives are not grounded here and wish to believe something else.

Today, we read the newspapers and magazine much more than we read the Holy Bible or the Lives of the Saints or other religious material. If you look at your bookshelf at home, how many religious books are found there? If there are more religious books on the shelves then we are running in the right direction. If not, than we are truly losing the race. We as Christians must focus more on the needs of our spiritual fulfillment than our physical well-being.

When was the last time we did something charitable? Give food to the hungry, water to the thirsty, clothing to the naked, visit the shut-in and helped at the church's fundraisers? These are the kind acts of Love that God wants us to be a part of.

Remember, all things, other than our faith, lead to death and nothingness. Only faith in Christ, in His church is eternal life. Instead, let us cling to our faith as the only real, tangible thing we can always carry with us.

THE POWER OF FIVE

TOP FIVE TIPS FOR STICKING TO YOUR FINANCIAL GOALS

Εἶναι δυνατό νά μάθεις τά παιδιά σου νά μήν καπνίζουν, νά μήν πίνουν, νά μήν χαρτοπαίζουν, νά μήν πέρνουν ναρχωτικά, νά μήν βρίζουν νά μήν συναναστρέφονται μέ κακές παρέες, νά μήν νυχτογυρίζουν, ὅταν ἐσύ ὁ γονιός τά κάνεις ὅλα ἤ καί μερικά ἀπ᾽ αὐτά;

Εἶναι δυνατό νά μάθεις τά παιδιά σου νά ἐκκλησιάζοναι τακτικά, νά προσεύχονται, νά εἶναι καλοί χριστιανοί, ὅταν ἐσύ ὁ γονιός δέν πατᾶς στήν ἐκκλησία, δέν κοινωνᾶς, δέν προσφέρεις γιά τή συντήρησή της, δέν προσεύγεσαι, δέν ζεῖς χριστιανική ζωή;

Εἶναι δυνατό ἐσύ ὁ ᾿Αρχιεπίσκοπος, ὁ Ἐπίσκοπος, ὁ Ἱερέας, ὁ κάθε κληρικός, νά κηρύττεις, καί νά ἀπαιτεῖς ἀπό τούς πιστούς σου, ἀγάπη, εἰρήνη, ταπεινοφροσύνη, συνεργασία, κατανόηση, φιλανθρωπία, γενναιοδωρία, δικαιοσύνη, ἰσότητα, ὑπομονή, καί ἐσύ νά κάνεις ἐντελῶς τό ἀντίθετο:

"Ας ἀχούσουμε ἀπό τό ἴδιο τό στόμα τοῦ Κυρίου μας: "Ξέρετε ὅτι οἱ ἡγέτες τῶν ἐθνῶν (τῶν εἰδολολατρῶν) ἀσχοῦν ἀπόλυτη ἐξουσία πάνω τους καί οἱ ἄρχοντες τά καταδυναστεύουν. Σέ σᾶς ὅμως δέν πρέπει νά συμβαίνει αὐτό, ἀλλά ὅποιος θέλει νά γίνει μεγάλος ἀνάμεσά σας πρέπει νά γίνει ὑπηρέτης σας κι'ὅποιος ἀπό σᾶς θέλει νά εἶναι πρῶτος πρέπει νά γίνει δοῦλος σας."Οπως κι'ὁ Γυιός τοῦ 'Ανθρώπου δέν ἦρθε γιά νά τόν ὑπηρετήσουν, ἀλλά γιά νά ὑπηρετήσει καί νά προσφέρει τή ζωή του λύτρο (ἀντάλλαγμα) γιά ὅλους" (Ματθαίου 20, 25-27).



— What Is At the End of the Road?

Where am I going? What's at the end of the road of life for me?

Jesus provides the answer in Matthew 25:31-46. Whether we know it or not — and we had better know it — we are all headed toward the second coming and the final judgment:

"When the Son of man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on his glorious throne. Before him will be gathered all the nations, and he will separate them one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will place the sheep at his right hand, but the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, O blessed of my father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world 'Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'Depart from me, you cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels . . . '" (Matt. 25:31-41).

In view of this, how ought I to live? What ought to be the direction of my life?

The Direction of My Life

An extremely important question in life for all of us is: Where am I going? What is the direction of my life? What road am I following? Where does this road lead? Will it take me to where I want to go? Would I like to spend eternity there?

Jesus talked much about the direction of his life. For example, when He says, "Thou shalt," or "Thou shalt not," he is pointing us to a direction in life. When He says, "This do and you shall live," or "Follow me," or "I am the Way," He is pointing us to what ought to be the direction and purpose of life.

In the sermon on the Mount, He said, "You have heard that it has been said, You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy, but I say to you, love your enemies." In other words, the direction of our life — the purpose — should be toward loving people.

On the night He instituted the Lord's Supper, the disciples were quarreling among themselves about who should be the greatest among them. And so the Master girded Himself with a towel and washed their feet. Then He said to them, "He that is greatest among you shall be your servant." In other words, the direction of our life should be toward serving. How well we see this when we hear Jesus saying, "As you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to Me. I was sick and you visited me. I was hungry and you fed Me..."

The direction of my life should be toward serving others, toward daily repentance, toward giving, toward prayer, toward Church, toward a closer, more personal relationship with God. If it is, then the future for us will be as bright as the promises of God.

How many kings and tyrants persecuted the Church of Christ?

Let the sea roar, it cannot dissolve the rock!...Let the waves rise, they cannot sink the ship of Jesus!

ORTHODOXY: This is the Faith of the Apostles!

If you are an Orthodox Christian, your Church was founded in 33AD by Jesus Christ, the Son of God, officially beginning at Pentecost with the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles. (Acts 2) The Orthodox Church is now 2000 years old, and has maintained an unbroken historical and doctrinal connection to the earliest Tradition of the Apostles.

If you are Lutheran, your religion was founded by Martin Luther, an ex-monk of the Catholic Church in 1517.

If you belong to the Church of England, King Henry VIII founded your church in 1530 because the Pope would not grant him a divorce with the right to remarry.

If you are a Presbyterian, your denomination was founded by John Knox in Scotland in 1560

If you are a Congregationalist, Robert Brown originated your denomination in Holland in 1582

If you are a Baptist, you owe the teachings of your church to John Smyth, who launched it in Amsterdam in 1606.

If you are Dutch Reformed, (i.e. Crystal Cathedral) you recognize Mitchlis Jones as founder because he originated your religion in New York in 1628.

If you are a Methodist, your religion was founded by John and Charles Wesley in England in 1774.

If you worship with the Salvation Army, your group began with William Booth in London in 1865

If you are Roman Catholic, your church shared the same rich apostolic and doctrinal heritage as the Orthodox Church for the first 1000 years of Christian history, but broke away from the other four apostolic Patriarchates in 1054 because the other four wouldn't consider the Pope to be infallible or their earthly boss. Besides, the dogma of the infallibility of the Pope did not come into the Roman Catholic Church until the year 1870!



If you belong to one of the organizations know as Church of the Nazarene, Pentecostal, Gospel, Jehovah's Witnesses, your religion is one of the hundreds of new groups founded within the past 100 Years.



The Komboschini (Prayer Rope)

Let us pause for a moment just to look at a little prayer rope, like this one made of black wool on Mountain Athos. It is a blessing from a holy place. Like so much that we have in the Church, it is a blessing prepared and given to us by a brother or father in Christ, a living witness to living tradition. It is black, the color of mourning and sorrow, and this reminds us to be sober and serious in our lives. We are taught that repentant prayer, especially the Jesus Prayer, can bring us what the Holy Fathers call joy-creating sorrow—in Greek "Harmolipi". We are sorry for our sins and our weakness and failings before God, our fellow men and ourselves; but in Christ, Who pours out His mercy and forgiveness on all who call upon His Name, this sorrow becomes a source of joy and comfort. This prayer rope is knotted from wool, that is, it has been sheared from a sheep, a reminder that we are rational sheep of the Good Shepherd, Christ the Lord, and also a reminder of the Lamb of God Who takes away the sins of the world (see: John 1:29). And the cross likewise speaks to us of the sacrifice and victory of

life over death, of humility over pride, of self-sacrifice over selfishness, of light over darkness. And the tassel? Well, you can use it to wipe the tears away from your eyes, or, if you have no tears, to remind you to weep because you cannot weep.

Besides, from the Old Testament times, little tassels have been a decoration for sacred vestments, a reminder of the sacred tradition in which we participate when we use the prayer rope.

Prayer ropes are made in keeping with a tradition whose origin is lost in antiquity. Perhaps one of the earliest forms was simply gathering small pebbles or seeds and moving them from one spot or container to another as one said his prayer rule or did his rule of bows or prostrations. The story is told of a monk who decided to make knots in a rope, which he could use in carrying out his daily rule of prayer. But the devil kept untying the knots he made in the rope, frustrating the poor monk's efforts. Then an angel appeared and taught the monk a special kind of knot that consists of ties of interlocked crosses, and these knots the devil was unable to unrayel.

Prayer ropes come in a great variety of forms and sizes. Most prayer ropes have a cross woven into them or attached to mark the "end", and also have some kind of marker after each 10, 25, or 50 knots or beads. There are many forms of prayer ropes, some knotted of wool or silk, or other more elegant or simpler materials. Others are made of beads or the dried flower of a plant called "Tears of the Mother of God."

The prayer rope is one of the items given to an Orthodox Christian monk at the time of tonsure: it is given to him as his spiritual sword with which he, as a soldier of Christ, must make war against our spiritual enemy, the devil. This sword is wielded by calling on the name of our Lord and God and Savior Jesus Christ in a plea for mercy on me a sinner. This prayer can be said in a shorter form, such as: "Lord Jesus Christ have mercy on me"; or in a longer form, as: "By the prayers of the Most Holy Theotokos and all the Saints, Lord Jesus Christ have mercy on me."

Other short prayers: the prayer of the publican: "God be merciful to me a sinner" (see: Luke 18:13), the prayer to the Mother of God: "Most Holy Theotokos save us", or other short prayers to the Guardian Angel, to individual saints or to all the saints can also be offered with the assistance of the prayer rope. A common form of such a prayer is: Holy Guardian Angel—or Saint (name)—pray to God for me. By changing the words of these short prayers and saying: "have mercy on us", or "pray for us", or by including the name or names of persons we want to pray for, we can also use the prayer rope for intercessory prayers. This also applies to those already departed this life: "Give rest O Lord to the soul of Thy servant."

When monks carry the prayer rope in their hands, it serves as a reminder of their obligation to pray unceasingly. In keeping with the commandment of the Holy Apostle Paul to "pray without ceasing." Anyone can keep a prayer rope in a pocket or some other discreet place where it can be easily used unnoticed when in situations where it is better to pray or remember prayer in secret, without attracting the attention of others. The prayer rope can also be placed over the head of our bed, in an automobile, with a small cross or icon, or in other appropriate places as a reminder of prayer and a kind of blessing and a holy and godly presence in our lives.

What Is Repentance?

"Repentance is the door through which we enter Lent, the starting-point of our Journey to Pascha. And to repent signifies far more than self-pity or futile regret over things done in the past. The Greek term 'Metania' means 'change of mind': to repent is to be renewed, to be transformed in our inward viewpoint, to attain a fresh way of looking at our relationship to God and to others.


The fault of the Pharisee is that he has no desire to change his outlook; he is complacent, self-satisfied, and so he allows no place for God to act within him.

The Publican, on the other hand, truly longs for a 'change of mind'; he is self-dissatisfied, 'poor in spirit', and where there is this saving self-dissatisfaction there is room for God to act.

Unless we learn the secret of the Publican's inward poverty, we shall not share in the Lenten springtime. The theme of the day can be summed up in a saying of the Desert Fathers: 'Better a man who has sinned, if he knows that he has sinned, and repents, than a man who has not sinned and thinks of himself as righteous.'"

During recent years we have all observed the overwhelming emphasis on the secular aspect of the Christmas holiday. The commercialization of this holiday begins in early autumn, when even advertisements on childrens' TV programs implant in their young minds what they will want on their "wish" lists. Would it not be more valuable for the children if, along with this year's

"hot" toy or electronic game, they were told about the Baby Jesus: the Gift we all receive at Christmas?

When we begin hearing, "Only- - - days before Christmas" the implication is that there are only so many shopping days remaining. Would it not be more significant for us if the message heralding Christmas were, "Advent has begun; let us prepare for the birth of Jesus the King?" If it were not for the anticipation of mounting "Black Friday" Christmas sales putting the retailers in the black for the year, it appears that the trend would be to obliterate this major religious holiday.

In America the shift away from the religious core of the holiday toward the commercial emphasis has been occurring rather gradually; a subtle attempt to hijack the real meaning of Christmas: public schools no longer close for Christmas, but for the "Winter break" (similarly "Spring break" at Easter). This trend has been apparent in the public schools' music concerts at which religious Christmas Carols are avoided; giving way to musical compositions extolling the joys of the winter season. Thusly, youngsters are influenced in their formative years.

Generic greetings of "Happy Holidays" abound instead of "Merry Christmas" identifying the holiday that we are honoring. Some have even taken to substituting "Xmas" for Christmas, shift of Christmas merrymaking has fled from the twelve days following Christmas through Epiphany to party time beginning early in December and all but forgotten on December 26th. As the late Very Rev.Fr. George Gallos of the Annunciation Church in Baltimore had noted in a sermon, "It is almost impossible to hear Christmas Carols on the day after Christmas." Sadly the elaborately decorated live Christmas trees that graced homes are too often seen in trash cans by December 27th. Unfortunately, most of us have simply accepted these trends not realizing that they serve to erode Christianity in our nation and perhaps in

the hearts and souls of "Christians". How could this be since America was founded on Judeo-Christian principles assuring each of us freedom OF religion not freedom FROM religion.

On a brighter and positive note however, we are now beginning to witness a surprising and pleasant turnaround during the Christmas season. Although commercialism still appears to dominate this holy season, the greeting which some major retailers are once again incorporating is "Merry Christmas". This is primarily due to the public outcry made known by many Christian churches. Likewise, the programs at a few of our public schools are including Christmas Carols and religious themes. The author notes that in observance of Advent the date of the annual Christmas dinner party of a Greek Orthodox senior group that had been traditionally held before Christmas was changed to January. As Orthodox Christians we should follow the teachings of our Church and become more active in reinstating Christian observances whenever or wherever we can. Can we afford to remain passive, taking our religion for granted? If we are devout Orthodox Christians, each of us has an obligation to proclaim, defend, and preserve Christianity. Of course, we must first LIVE our Orthodox faith following the principles set for us by Christ our Lord and Savior, our teacher, and role model. We must stand united in a secular world defending all of our high holy days such as Christmas.

Just as we prepare and decorate our homes to receive Christ externally, as Orthodox Christians we must prepare our hearts to receive Him. Coming close to Him should head our "Wish List" as we pray, attend, and participate in religious services, and follow dietary abstinence as prescribed by the Church. All the hype of our Christmas observances should not simply be done in a pagan style to brighten the darkness of winter days or in anticipation of the material gifts that we are about to give and receive. The giving of Christmas gifts should remind us that this tradition is in remembrance of our joy in receiving God's greatest gift His Son Jesus our Lord and Savior. The use of Christmas lights to welcome Jesus should remind us that we are about to receive the True LIGHT of the World. Displaying the crèche in our homes should remind us of Christ's HUMILITY; our Savior was born in a manger among the farm animals, not in a royal palace fit for a king. Showing kindness and sharing with others, especially at this time of the year, should serve to reinforce in us the life that Jesus led: shunning no one, walking among and mingling with the common folk, not the select few of a certain upper class, while teaching and living His message of LOVE. Sending greetings and contacting others at Christmastime give us the opportunity to extol our joy that Christ the King is born! Our traditions should aid in warming our hearts and enriching our celebration of Christmas - - - the fulfillment of God's plan as prophesied in the Old Testament: the coming of His Son, the Messiah to save us from our sinful ways.


Lest we forget.....Jesus is the reason for the Christmas season.


