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

CHRIST IS RISEN!! TRULY HE IS RISEN!!

On behalf of the entire Community of St. Demetrios, I greet you with the words - CHRIST IS RISEN!

All through the Great Lenten Period and Holy Week, we relived the events of our Lord's Passions and Resurrection. It was so wonderful to see our church filled with our beautiful parishioners, visitors, and friends through the 40 day Lenten journey. I would like to take this great opportunity to thank all of our faithful parishioners who gave up their precious time to help out with all the events that the church went through during the Pascal season. Also to those who gave with their hearts and donated all the items that were needed throughout the Lenten Period and especially throughout the Holy Week services. Thank all of you who donated the beautiful flower arrangements, the Pascal Candle, the Easter Lilies, the Crucifixion and Resurrection Wreaths. Thank you to the Ladies Philoptochos society for decorating the amazing Epitaphio, as well as the young men of our parish who carried the Epitaphio through the streets of North Wildwood. These are unforgettable moments, and they should stay close to our hearts forever.

We gathered in the church throughout Holy Week to come to the climax and celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Through Holy Week we walked together through the pages of the New Testament. We witnessed together and watched as we re-enacted the Passions of our Lord. We were there at Bethany, when Jesus commanded Lazarus to come out from the tomb; we were there when Jesus came to Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. How thousands of people came to greet Him and put down Palm branches along the road. How people cheered "Hosanna". We witnessed the betrayal of Judas in the Garden; we witnessed the beating and the suffering of our Lord in the hands of the Romans. We witnessed the hatred of the Jews towards Christ. After all Christ did for mankind especially to the Jews, they rewarded Him with Crucifixion. We witnessed together Christ nailed to the Cross. We witnessed His pain and suffering, when He cried out "I Thirst", My God My God why have you forsaken

Me? We listened to the words of Christ when He bowed His head and said: "It is Finished" and "Father into the hands I commit my Spirit". We watched as His body was taken from the Cross by Joseph of Arimatheas, and he put his body in the Tomb. All their hopes and dreams were buried with Him. Holy Friday and Holy Saturday, they mourned their Savior until finally on the First day of the Week, early in the morning as we Orthodox celebrate the First Resurrection on Holy Saturday morning. The women woke up early that morning and went to the tomb to anoint Christ's body, but when they arrived they found that the huge stone had already been rolled away. As an angel told them, "You're looking in the wrong place. If you're looking for Jesus among the dead, He is not dead He is alive, He is risen. This is what we celebrate today as Orthodox Christians, that truly Christ is Risen.

The 15th Chapter of 1 Corinthians is the great resurrection chapter. Verses 1-8 St. Paul writes: "Now brothers, I want to remind you of the Gospel I preached to you which you received and on which you have taken your stand". The question here is, "DO YOU BELIEVE THAT JESUS DIED, AND ROSE FROM THE DEAD!" You might ask? Did anyone see Him after His death? Answer: Of course they did? The Myrrhbearing women who went to the Tomb and found it empty as scriptures says. He appeared to Peter and then to His 12 Disciples. He appeared to more than 500 brothers at the sametime before He ascended. He appeared to James, and He appeared to Cleopas and Nathaniel on the road to Emmaus. The list could go on and on but I will stop here, because I want to focus on something also very important.

When we say "Christ is Risen" these words must fill our hearts with joy and to affirm within ourselves that we believe in someone who as God and Man smashed the domain of death and showed us the path to salvation and eternal life. So if what we just read gives us the opportunity to truly believe that Christ died on the Cross for us so that we can have eternal life with Him, then if we follow Him we made the right decision and chose the path of Christ, leading us to a wonderful life that never ends. But this also means that if we accept this path there is a lot of faith and works to be done if we want to reach that goal that Christ set out for us. If you follow this recipe, you're on your way to eternal life with Christ.

We need to have Faith, Works, Love, Obedience, Sacramental life, Truth, Forgiveness, Bearing Fruit, Perseverance, and last we must Practice and be true doers of the Word of God. If you follow this recipe then you are on your way to a better life in this world and in the world to come.

In conclusion Let us worship Him, the Lord of Life and Death. The Lord who is Risen and who bestows Resurrection upon all creation. He is the "Bread of Life" who has come down from Heaven and who has given life to the world. Let us also glorify God with Thanksgiving and with great joy. Let us greet each other everyday with the Holy Kiss, repeating for the next 40 days until His Ascension: "THAT CHRIST IS RISEN, AND THAT HE IS TRULY RISEN." Amen.

Archepiscopal & Synodical Encyclical for the Sunday of the Veneration of the Holy Cross

April 7, 2024

Unto the Most Reverend and Right Reverend Hierarchs, Pious Priests and Deacons, Monks and Nuns, Presidents and Members of the Parish Councils, Honorable Archons of the Ecumenical Patriarchate, Members of Leadership 100, Day and Afternoon Schools, Philoptochos Societies, Youth, Greek Orthodox Organizations, and entirety of the Christloving Plenitude of the Sacred Archdiocese of America:

Καὶ τὰ φύλλα τοῦ Ξύλου εἰς θεραπείαν τῶν ἐθνῶν. (Ἀποκάλυψις 22:2) And the leaves of the Tree were for the healing of the Nations. (Revelation 22:2)

Beloved sisters and brothers in Christ,

In the midway point of the Holy Lent, we arrive at the oasis of the Sunday of the Veneration of the Holy Cross. Now the Tree of the Cross overshadows us with its healing leaves and fruits, and the flowers with which we adorn It in the Divine Service reflect Its lively glory. The Cross, once an instrument of suffering and death, has become the Tree of Eternal Life, and we are invited to share in Its mission of redemption and salvation. It is because of this mission that the Holy Eparchial Synod has decided to that an Encyclical should be issued every year for Feast of the Veneration of the Holy Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The Lord calls each and every one of us to pick up our own cross and follow Him, to walk the path of self-sacrificial love that led Him to Golgotha and to the Garden Tomb. This invitation is for every Christian, whether we have fully understand that call or not. Those who aspire to the Holy Priesthood through the laying on of hands often tell of hearing a distinct calling, which is named a "vocation." They feel they are being summoned to serve Christ and His Church as clergy, and so they work with their local



priest and Hierarch, and find their way to our beloved Hellenic College and Holy Cross School of Theology, to pursue studies that lead to ordination. We should all encourage this noble and indeed sacred pursuit, and fill Hellenic College and Holy Cross with candidates to serve the future generations of our Church in America.

In this season of the Great Lent, when our fasting is to be augmented by almsgiving, let us all strive to dedicate an offering to our beloved Theological School, and give tangible, financial support those who are answering the call of the Lord in their very specific mission. Those who choose to take up the cross of service in the Holy Priesthood – whether they are called to be Deacons, Presbyters, or Hierarchs – are called to a lifelong sacrifice of their will, and they surely merit our support and our appreciation.

Therefore, let us answer the call of the Lord today as best as we are able, and enter into the oasis of the Veneration of the Holy Cross. There, we will find refreshment and healing from the Tree of Eternal Life, and find the strength to continue our Lenten journey to the Great and Holy Pascha.

Προσφιλεῖς ἀδελφοὶ καὶ ἀδελφὲς ἐν Χριστῷ,

Στὸ μέσον τῆς Άγίας καὶ Μεγάλης Τεσσαρακοστῆς, ἡ Ἐκκλησία μας ἔχει τοποθετήσει τὴν ὄαση τῆς Κυριακῆς τῆς Σταυροπροσκυνήσεως. Σήμερα τὸ ξύλο τοῦ Σταυροῦ μᾶς ἐπισκιάζει μὲ τὰ θεραπευτικά του φύλλα καὶ τοὺς καρπούς, ἐνῶ τὰ ἄνθη μὲ τὰ ὁποῖα τὸ προσκυνοῦμε στὶς ἱερὲς ἀκολουθίες ἀντανακλοῦν τὴν ζῶσα δόξα του. Ὁ σταυρός, ἀπὸ ὄργανο βασανισμοῦ καὶ θανάτου, γίνεται τὸ δένδρο τῆς αἰωνίου ζωῆς. Καλούμαστε σήμερα νὰ μετάσχουμε σὲ αὐτὴ τὴν πορεία λύτρωσης καὶ σωτηρίας ποὺ μᾶς δείχνει ὁ ζωοποιὸς Σταυρός. Αὐτὸς εἶναι καὶ ὁ λόγος γιὰ τὸν ὁποῖο ἡ Ἱερὰ Ἐπαρχιακὴ Σύνοδος ἀποφάσισε νὰ ἐκδίδει κάθε χρόνο Ἐγκύκλιο, κατὰ τὴν Κυριακὴ τῆς Προσκυνήσεως τοῦ Τιμίου καὶ ζωοποιοῦ Σταυροῦ τοῦ Κυρίου ἡμῶν Ἰησοῦ Χριστοῦ.

Ό Κύριος προσκαλεῖ τὸν καθέναν ἀπὸ ἐμᾶς, «νὰ ἄρει τὸ σταυρὸν αὐτοῦ καὶ νὰ τὸν ἀκολουθήσει». Νὰ βαδίσουμε δηλαδὴ στὸ ἴδιο μονοπάτι τῆς ἀγάπης καὶ τῆς θυσίας ποὺ βάδισε ὁ ἴδιος πρὸς τὸ Γολγοθᾶ καὶ τὸν τάφο. Ἡ πρόσκληση αὐτὴ ἀπευθύνεται πρὸς κάθε χριστιανό, εἴτε ἔχουμε ἀντιληφθεῖ αὐτὴ τὴν κλήση εἴτε ὅχι. Μία ἰδιαίτερη «κλήση» νιώθουν ὅσοι ποθοῦν τὴν ἱερωσύνη διὰ τῆς ἐπιθέσεως τῶν χειρῶν. Νιώθουν νὰ προσκαλοῦνται νὰ ὑπηρετήσουν τὸ Χριστὸ καὶ τὴν Ἐκκλησία του ὡς κληρικοί. Ἐτσι, ἀφοῦ συμβουλευτοῦν τὸν ἱερέα τῆς ἐνορίας τους καὶ τὸν ἱεράρχη τους, κατευθύνονται πρὸς τὸ ἀγαπημένο μας Ἑλληνικὸ Κολλέγιο καὶ τὴ Θεολογικὴ Σχολὴ τοῦ Τιμίου



Σταυφοῦ, γιὰ νὰ κάνουν τὶς σπουδὲς ποὺ ὁδηγοῦν στὴ χειφοτονία. Εἶναι ἀδήφιτη ἀνάγκη νὰ ἐνθαφφύνουμε ὅλοι μας τὸν εὐγενῆ αὐτὸ στόχο καὶ νὰ γεμίσουμε τὸ Ἑλληνικὸ Κολλέγιο καὶ τὴν Θεολογικὴ Σχολὴ τοῦ Τιμίου Σταυφοῦ μὲ ὑποψηφίους κληφικοὺς ποὺ θὰ διακονήσουν τὶς ἑπόμενες γεννεὲς τῆς Ἐκκλησίας μας στὴν Ἀμεφική.

Reflections on why we believe that there is a God and there is Eternal Life after Death

Question? How do we know that God is who He says He is? If we look at the Disciples of the Lord, they were normal fisherman doing what they do every day. They had their families, their work, they had their homes- in fact everything was going very well for them. But then, how does a person give up all these things to follow a person who they don't even know. They met Him for the first time. This is a very good question? I will give all of you who are reading this article a simple answer. This man that they met," WAS JESUS CHRIST" in all His Divine and Human

natures. The Disciples upon meeting Christ must have felt His overwhelming power to attract men to Him. No one leaves his job, his family, his wife, and his children to follow someone that they don't know and trust. It has nothing to do with trust, but they were "CHOSEN BY GOD." That is the simple answer, and one by one they all accepted to follow Him.

Let's take another option or example: Andrew the first called Disciple, what did he see in this stranger. Peter who was somewhat the strongest of all

the disciples, why did he follow Christ? Because when you see and hear of His teachings, His miracles, how can you not believe in God? When the disciples witnessed these events, they knew for a fact that Christ was not just a normal man. He had Godly powers, and His preaching was all about love. So let's take the examples of the disciples, we don't have to go any further. They followed Him to their death. Would you leave everything behind especially your own flesh and blood to follow a person to your own death? I would doubt that very much. But they did (Why)? Because they had proof that He was the Messiah that the Old Testament and Prophesies were writing about. In His 33 years of Ministry on this earth Jesus taught, preached, that the Kingdom of God is at hand, and that we should repent for our sins and be baptized in Christ. There is so much history and truth that God does exist. We should all research and feel in our hearts that Christ is our true God and Savior. Let's take the examples of His miracles. He healed paralytics, Lepers, demoniacs, He raised Lazarus and others from their deaths. He fed the 5,000 people with 2 fish and 5 loaves of bread. After His death He went down to Hades and brought up those who heard His preaching and be-



lieved. We see that in the Icon of the Resurrection where He takes the hands of Adam and Eve and raises them up with Him. He proved to His disciples in the Upper Room, that He did truly resurrect, He proved it to Mary Madeline and others who went to the empty tomb. After 8 days Christ came back to Thomas to show him that He truly arose from His death. He also came back to them on Pentecost. He showed Himself to over 500 people after His death. How much more proof do we need to say that Christ is alive and His kingdom is open to all of us when we leave this earth.

Can you also imagine when Christ took Peter, James, and John to the Mountain of Tabor during His Transfiguration? Are you serious and you still don't believe?? Isn't that enough proving that God does exist? How much more proof does anyone need? There are thousands of writings in the Old Testament that proves that Christ does exist. How many devout Christians who have died because they followed Christ without even seeing Him. Who would give up their life enduring tortures, prison, beatings, thrown to Lions, and being beheaded just for the name of Christ? How many Christians who died by the sword, died by hanging, died by crucifixion, died in prison form tortures and they didn't see Christ but believed in Him. WHO DOES THAT! How can I plainly put this in writ-


ing, and still have critics that don't believe and are atheistic in their beliefs and they don't even have an inch of proof that Jesus Christ is not God.

How can 2 thousand years go by with billions of Christians who believe in Christ not be true. This is not a fad, or a made up story that comes and goes. This is real- Jesus Christ does exist and He is our True God and Savior. Let's take another example, if we take the "SAINTS" of the Church. Look what they have provided throughout the centuries expressing their faith and teachings for Jesus Christ.

Why would thousands of Saints leave everything from this world to join Monasteries all over the world demonstrating their faith and depriving themselves of the earthly riches and pleasures, and a good life, to live a life of isolation, and poverty? What changes a person to accept that kind of life to live their entire life solely for Jesus Christ? The thousands of stories in history of people who were healed from rare diseases, even today miracles still exist in this world that we live in. How do miracles happen? (Is it magic)? Of course not? It's people that have faith in Christ, and that's how miracles happen. It's through their faith they receive their healing, and through the blessings of our Almighty God and Father Jesus Christ.

Reading

When Friday dawned, Christ was sent bound from Caiaphas to Pontius Pilate, who was then Governor of Judea. Pilate interrogated Him in many ways, and once and again acknowledged that He was innocent, but to please the Jews, he later passed the sentence of death against Him. After scourging the Lord of all as though He were a runaway slave, he surrendered Him to be crucified.

Thus the Lord Jesus was handed over to the soldiers, was stripped of His garments, was clothed in a purple robe, was crowned with a wreath of thorns, had a reed placed in His hand as though it were a sceptre, was bowed before in mockery, was spat upon, and was buffeted in the face and on the head. Then they again clothed Him in His own garments, and bearing the cross, He came to Golgotha, a place of condemnation, and there, about the third hour, He was crucified between thieves. two Although both blasphemed Him at the first, the thief at His right hand repented, and said: "Remember me, O Lord, when Thou comest in Thy Kingdom," to which Saviour answered, "Today shalt thou be with Me in Paradise." As He hung upon the Cross, He was blasphemed by those who were passing by, was mocked by the high priests,

and by the soldiers was given vinegar to drink mixed with gall. About the ninth hour, He cried out with a loud voice, saying, "It is finished." And the Lamb of God "Which taketh away the sin of the world" (John 1:29) expired on the day when the moon was full, and at the hour when, according to the Law, was slain the Passover lamb, which was established as a type of Him in the time of Moses.

Even lifeless creation mourned the death of the Master, and it trembled and was altered out of fear. Yet, even though the Maker of creation was already dead, they pierced Him in His immaculate side, and forthwith came there out Blood and Water. Finally, at about the

setting of the sun, Joseph of Arimathea came with Nicodemus (both of them had been secret disciples of Jesus), and they took down the all-holy Body of the Teacher from the Cross and anointed it with aromatic spices, and wrapped it in a clean linen cloth. When they had buried Him in a new tomb, they rolled a great stone over its entrance.

Such are the dread and saving sufferings of our Lord Jesus Christ commemorated today, and in remembrance of them, we have received the Apostolic commandment that a fast be observed every Friday.

Mary Magdalene, and the other women who were present at the burial of our Saviour on Friday evening, returned from Golgotha to the city and prepared fragrant spices and myrrh, so that they might anoint the body of Jesus. On the morrow, because of the law which forbids work on the day of the Sabbath, they rested for the whole day. But at early dawn on the Sunday that followed, almost thirty-six hours since the death of the Life-giving Redeemer, they came to the sepulchre with the spices to anoint His body. While they were considering the difficulty of rolling away the stone from the door of the sepulchre, there was a fearful earthquake; and an Angel, whose countenance shone

like lightning and whose garment was white as snow, rolled away the stone and sat upon it. The guards that were there became as dead from fear and took to flight. The women, however, went into the sepulchre, but did not find the Lord's body. Instead, they saw two other Angels in the form of youths clothed in white, who told them that the Saviour was risen, and they sent forth the women, who ran to proclaim to the disciples these gladsome tidings. Then Peter and John arrived, having learned from Mary Magdalene what had come to pass, and when they entered the tomb, they found only the winding Therefore, sheets.

returned again to the city with joy, as heralds now of the supernatural Resurrection of Christ, Who in truth was seen alive by the disciples on this day on five occasions.

Our Lord, then, was crucified, died, and was buried on Friday, before the setting of the sun, which was the first of His "three days" in the grave; observing the mystical Sabbath, that "seventh day" in which it is said that the Lord "rested from all His works" (Gen. 2:2-3), He passed all of Saturday in the grave; and He arose "while it was yet dark, very early in the morning" on Sunday, the third day, which, according to the Hebrew reckoning, began after sunset on Saturday.

As we celebrate today this joyous Resurrection, we greet and embrace one another in Christ, thereby demonstrating our Saviour's victory over death and corruption, and the destruction of our ancient enmity with God, and His reconciliation toward us, and our inheritance of life everlasting. The feast itself is called Pascha, which is derived from the Hebrew word which means "passover"; because Christ, Who suffered and arose, has made us to pass over from the curse of Adam and slavery to the devil and death unto our primal freedom and blessedness. In addition, this day of this particular week, which is the first of all the rest, is dedicated to the honour of the Lord; in honour and remembrance of the Resurrection, the Apostles transferred to this day the rest from labour that was formerly assigned to the Sabbath of the ancient Law.







PART IV and final article of the Pilgrimage to the Holy Land which appeared in the October, 2010 issue of the St. Nicholas KOINONIA.


Day 5 Monday — While most group members were sleeping, five brave members of our group gathered at 1:30 a.m. to climb Mount Sinai to witness the magnificent sunrise. The remaining members attended the early Divine Liturgy service in the ancient Basilica of the Transfiguration within the monastery. After the service, we were invited to venerate the holy relics of Saint Catherine and given a silver ring in remembrance of her dream of receiving a ring from Jesus as His bride. When Saint Catherine awoke, she found a ring on her finger! We also visited the monastery's world-renowned museum. After greeting the exhilarated Mount Sinai climbers, the group departed for the return trip to Israel. We were reunited with our guide Raed Makhouli who took us to a mall in Eilat to enjoy a meal at McDonald's! We continued on to Mount Tabor to visit the Church of the Transfiguration. From there we could see the Valley of Armageddon where the Book of Revelation tells us the last battle between good and evil will take place. We then checked into our hotel in Tiberias for dinner and rest.

Day 6 Tuesday — Our first stop of the day was the Monastery of St. Gerasimos lordanitis, which is one of the oldest monasteries in the world founded in 455 A.D. It is said that the Virgin Mary, Joseph and Jesus rested there during their flight to Egypt. St. Gerasimos is known for removing a thorn from the paw of a lion which became his lifelong companion. Upon the death of St. Gerasimos, the lion stayed by his side until its own death. Moving on to Nazareth, we visited the Greek Orthodox Church of the Annunciation where we drank water from the same well that Mary drew water daily. We also visited the house of Joseph where he was told by the Angel to not be afraid to take the Virgin Mary as his wife. This was the same house where Jesus lived the first 30 years of His life. That evening we had the pleasure of meeting Raed's mother, brother Fr. Theodosios and his Presbytera.

Day 7 Wednesday - The day began with a scenic boat ride on the Sea of Galilee. The boat crew honored us by flying the American flag and playing the American and Greek national anthems. Upon landing at Tabgha, we visited the pastoral setting of the Mount of the Beatitudes where Jesus preached the Sermon on the Mount. We travelled further to visit the Church of the Multiplication of the Fishes and Loaves (Heptaghion). Capernaum was our next stop where Jesus performed many of His miracles. There we saw the house where Jesus healed Peter's mother-in-law and the synagogue where He taught regularly. Then we went on to Yardenit on the River Jordan, the

In Luke 8:22 - Jesus asked, "Where is your Faith?" I truly believe that this is the same question the Lord would like to ask us today? "Where is your Faith."


Where or what do you put your trust in? In yourself, or in your own wisdom and strength. Do you put your trust in your Career, or do you put your trust in your Family. It is well known and researched that NO human being can live without faith in someone or something. If we take a Christian or a non Christian person, they both have faith but the difference between the two is the object of their faith. And this is what we are going to focus on in this article. (The Object of Faith). In Hebrews 11: 6 it states: And without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to Him must believe that He exists and that He rewards those who earnestly seek Him. In today's society many people would rather believe the advertisements they see or hear. They take the word of someone else and most of the time they believe that it is true. (Gossip) or (Human knowledge. They believe everything that is written in magazines, newspapers, and television, not knowing that all those who write these things are not always right because they see things in their own opinion and perspectives. We face many challenges in our lives and we go through many stormy situations but there are ways to overcome them. If we look back over 2,000 years ago when Jesus Christ came to the Jordan River to be baptized by John the Baptist, the waters of the Jordan as soon as Christ came out of the waters, they completely did a U turn meaning that instead of the water flowing in the same direction miracously they changed and the waters turned the opposite way. (This I personally know and witnessed when I traveled to the Holy Lands and saw where Jesus was baptized). The waters completely changed their course and not only did they change their course, nut from clear water they turned into muddy waters. How does that happen and Why this change. Since I am one this issue, I would like to ask you this question? Has anyone reading this article made a U-turn in their lives. Has anyone made a change for the positive from leading a negative and sinful life? We have many examples of people in the Bible who made this U-turn in their lives.

Where you ever in a wrong place at the wrong time, and your life has become a mess because of that? Have you ever been on the road and at one point you felt you were lost. Making wrong choices and taking wrong directions is a part of life. There is nothing progressive about being stubborn and pigheaded and refusing to admit that you made a mistake.

When the Prodigal Son, repented for his mistake he didn't just sit there and feel sorry for himself. He immediately changed the direction of his life. Remember what he said: "will rise and go to my Father. When Moses threw his staff into the Red Sea and the waters where separated, dint God change the course of life for the Jews. Of Course He Did. If we open to the Old Testament in the book of Numbers chapter 21, we read that the Judaic people were under the guidance and leadership of Moses, when they left Egypt to find that land of honey they were traveling in the wilderness for 40 years. They had nothing, but God did not abandon them. He fed them prime meat; He gave them Manna instead of bread. They should have been proud of God and worshipped Him faithfully, but did they do that? No! Instead they started to curse Him, and went against Him. This is the thank you they gave to Him. We see this story going on and even to our Lord's Crucifixion, did anything really change? 





Intermittent fasting is growing in popularity. For those unfamiliar with the practice, intermittent fasting is when a person purposefully fasts for most of the day and takes in calories only within a specific block of time. Typically the fast lasts between 12 and 16 hours.

THE HISTORY

Our hunter-gatherer ancestors didn't have the modern luxuries of grocery stores, refrigerators or easy access to food. As a result, humans have evolved to be able to function without food for extended periods of time. Fasting has also been practiced for centuries for religious or spiritual reasons.

THE BENEFITS

According to the National Institute on Aging, fasting improves biomarkers of disease, reduces oxidative stress, and preserves learning and memory functioning. High insulin levels are often the culprit for diabetes and obesity. Between meals, insulin levels will go down and fat cells can then release stored sugars to be used as energy. We lose weight and improve our health if insulin levels fall. The idea of intermittent fasting is to allow the levels to go down far and long enough that we begin to burn off our fat stores.

THE TIMING

Our metabolisms have adapted to a daytime-

food, nighttime-sleep schedule. Late-night eating is linked to a higher risk of obesity and diabetes. While studies show fasting to be effective, it's often hard for people to follow. It's important to find a schedule that works with your lifestyle for it to be effective and sustainable, especially when combined with a plant-based diet. Many find eating between noon and 8 p.m. works best.

THE START

If you usually eat breakfast, this may be a challenge for you. In time, your body will adapt and the feelings of hunger will subside. When fasting, you can have caffeine, which acts an an appetite suppresant. Stay away from creamers, sugar, or other



calories in your coffee or tea; those calories will break your fast. Stick to an all-natural, zero-calorie sweetener like stevia or monk fruit.

THE SECRET

Drink plenty of water. Often when we feel hungry, our body is confusing it with thirst. Consuming water first thing in the morning will help alleviate hunger pangs and flush out your system from overnight.
