

#### WHAT DOES CHRISTMAS MEAN TO YOU?

I have wanted to write this article for a long time, but the Christmas Spirit comes once a year! (Does it though!) Before I begin, I wanted to give you a little background on what "Christmas" should mean to all of us. Let's take the word "Christmas" - if we break down the word Christ/ mas, we see that the word in English does not really tell us that it is the birth of Christ. What it really means is that Christ is with us, but if we take the word in Greek, "Xristou/ genna," we can define the word as truly the birth of Christ or Nativity of the Lord. The Christmas season is such a beautiful time of the year. Lights, candles, cold weather, and snowflakes begin to decorate our streets. People begin to decorate their homes, their businesses with colors of Christmas. We have to ask ourselves a few questions? "What does Christmas really me to me? "Was Christ born the way the Bibles states? "Who is this Christ child, and why should we believe in this wonderful story?" For one, these questions are very dear to me, but on the other hand, very difficult to answer. Whatever I tell you, it could be biased because as your priest everyone knows where I will always stand on issues like these.

But by balancing over these questions, everyone truly needs to know "The truth about Christmas." During the celebration of the Birth of our Lord, billions of people attend church services somewhere in the world, celebrating this miraculous event. Do you know that more people attend church during the Christmas Holidays, than they do attending any sports activity? People all over the world attend religious services or activities during this Holiday, but do they really know or have an idea why they attend these services. Why do billions of people celebrate the Birth of Christ on December 25th? Many go to church out of tradition because our mom

or dad told us to. Some of us go out of guilt. Many of us go to church out of habit, and many Christians don't attend at all. Which category do you fall into? We should have a message to all those people to remind them, (why we do what we do). Why do we get out of bed to go to church? Did you ever ask yourselves this question? Why do we go to the great expense to build churches, halls, gymnasiums, schools, and parking lots? What purpose is there for us to do all of these things? My brothers and sisters, we do all these things because of Christ. Let's not forget that cold winter night 2,000 years ago on December 25th a Messiah was born to bring redemption and salvation to the world. If it wasn't for the Birth of Christ, it gives me no meaning or purpose even to write this article. Tell all the Disciples, John the Baptist, the Prophets, that the Birth of Christ is a myth and not true. Tell the people who were healed of their infirmities that Christ is a lie. Tell the tons of thousands who gave their life for Him. To those who He changed their lives, how can we erase historical events that happened and were written before our time. But Jesus stated, "Blessed art those who have not seen me and yet believe." There would be no need for all these buildings we have, or the money that our church accumulates throughout the year. We would not need the people of the parish to bustle and hustle to put out fundraisers and activities to keep our community alive. None of the above would have been needed if it wasn't for the Birth of our Lord. It's incredible to see that today in the 21st century 2000 years later, we are still talking about this Christ child that was born of a Virgin Mother on Christmas day. How could an event like this continue to wonder our minds and thoughts, because I will tell you why? It is a true happening, a real event that took place in history and that we as Christians believe whole heartedly. Just open the New Testament and you will find the chapters, which describe this indescribable birth. (St. Matthew's Genealogy of the Birth of Christ) Matthew chapters 1, 2. St. Luke's chapter 3, verses 23-38 and chapter 2, verses 1-7. These chapters of the Bible tell it all. It gives everyone the information and insight of this true reality.

Then why is it that in today's society, we still have millions and billions of people who do not believe in this event? People always give the answer "If I don't see it with my own eyes I will not believe." My brothers and sisters, we believe in many things that we haven't seen in this world. It is impossible to see or witness everything that happens in this world that we live in. But in this Nativity of Christ, we can name people who were true witnesses of this birth. We have Joseph, Mary the mother of our Lord so how could a mother

forget the birth of her child. We have the wise men, the shepherds who witnessed the birth of Christ in Bethlehem. Ask the 14,000 children that were taken from their families and were killed and slain by King Herod during the first two years of His birth. The relics of those children still remain as visible proof of what happened during the birth of the Messiah, Jesus Christ. If we take the Old Testament, why do the Jews believe in it? From the Book of Genesis until the book of Malachi, why are these books true to their writings and not the Books of the New Testament? That means that we have a society that picks and chooses whatever they want to believe. I could go on and on and give other references that state the birth from the virgin the Book of Isaiah, and the Book of Enoch, but this could continue to be written in other newsletters as reference articles.

But getting back to the main topic of this article, in our society, Christmas has a new meaning. We can see pictures of a jolly old man with snow-white hair and a flowing beard and today we call him "Santa Claus" or "Jolly old St. Nicholas" or in the Greek Tradition "St. Basil." All the children of the world are thrilled at the magical tale, as "Santa Claus" becomes more real to our society than the birth of Christ. By some strange coincidence, the idea of Santa Claus developed in many countries and at the same time was brought here to America by the first settlers, united in an unprecedented manner with Santa Claus becoming the symbol of Christmas and enlightening a whole world of people to a new tradition. But what we should be concentrating on is to bring a real tradition, returning to the real spirit of Christmas, which is the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ and the Savior of mankind. But today's world thinks all together differently. We have taken religion out of public schools. We have groups of people that want to deny us the right to celebrate our Major Feast Days as a nation. Commercialism has invaded the sanctity of one of the most sacred feasts of Christendom. Today, Christmas is celebrated not because of the birth of Christ, but more so for financial reasons. They are using "Christmas" as a financial market to gain billions of dollars. We have been guided by them to follow a mistaken direction. When you ask a child, "What do you want for Christmas?" they never express the thought of worshipping and glorifying God. What they always express, I want the most expensive gift or toy that is on the market. We as parents are not teaching our children what Christmas truly means, we are showing them what they can make out of this Christmas moment. What we need to teach our children is that Christ and the Church should be the center of their lives. When we worship our Lord, we are simply building a lifelong relationship and we are centering and building a life around God. God didn't put us on this earth to live a self-centered life. He didn't put us here for our own personal benefits. He put us on this earth for His benefit. We exit for God and not vise-versa.



### The Nativity of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ in the Flesh December 25

#### Introduction

The Feast of the Nativity of Jesus is one of the most joyful days of the Orthodox Church. It ranks next to the greatest holiday, the Resurrection of Jesus. The Feast of the Birth of Iesus is also known as the "Incarnation of Christ." This means that Jesus became a man and came into the world to save us. We also refer to this joyous feast as Christmas.

#### BIBLICAL STORY

The story of the Nativity of Christ is beautifully told in the Holy Scriptures. The story is found in Matthew 1:18-25 and in Luke 2:1-20. No matter how often the Birth of Jesus is told, we realize that it is an important event.

As the story is told by the Apostles, the Roman Empire was powerful. The Romans had conquered much of the then known world. Judea and Samaria, what we know today as Israel, were included in their conquests. Emperor Augustus ordered that a census be taken in all his lands. He needed to know how many people lived in the empire so he could tax them. Everyone had to go to the town of their family's origin

to register for the census. This meant that Mary and Joseph had to go to Bethlehem. They were descendants of King David and Bethlehem was the City of David.

Mary and Joseph lived in Nazareth and it was a great distance from Bethlehem. It was about 100 miles over very rugged roads. Moreover, Mary was expecting the baby and it was almost time for her to give birth. Bethlehem was a small town and there were many descendants of David who had come to register for the census. By the time Mary and Joseph arrived in Bethlehem there was no place for them to stay. Joseph tried very hard to find a place to sleep that evening. There was no room at the inn. Finally, Joseph found a cave-like place where they could rest. This place was used by shepherds to protect their sheep in stormy weather. It was here that Mary gave birth to Jesus. The baby was wrapped in swaddling clothes and laid in the straw in the manger.

Now, that night the shepherds were out in the fields guarding their sheep. Suddenly, there was a bright light which startled the shepherds. The light was so bright that it turned the night into daylight. Of course, the shepherds were frightened. Nothing such as this had ever happened. Soon an angel appeared and calmed them. The angel said:

"Fear not for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior; which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you: You shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger" (Luke 2:11-12).

Then a larger group of angels appeared. They praised and glorified God and sang, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, and good will toward men" (Luke 2:14). When the angels finished singing, they disappeared and the light began to fade. It became dimmer and dimmer until it was dark again. The shepherds were awed. They didn't know what to do. Finally, they decided to leave their flocks of sheep and go to Bethlehem. They decided that they wanted to see for themselves what the angels had told them. When they got to Bethlehem, they found Mary, Joseph, and the infant Jesus. They fell to their knees and adored Jesus.

Some Wise Men came from the East for they knew of the coming of Jesus. They had seen a star that told them that a new king had been born to the Jews. They followed the star and were looking for the child. At this time the governor of Judea was King Herod. He was a wicked man and was feared and hated by the people. When Herod heard about the Wise Men looking for the child, he invited them to his palace. Herod asked the Wise Men to find the child so that he, too, could worship Him. But Herod was lying. He did not want anyone to take his place. The Wise Men went on to look for Jesus. The Star led them to Jesus and Mary. When the Wise Men found Jesus, they fell to their knees and worshipped Him. They gave Jesus gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. The Wise Men left but did not return to Herod. They had a dream that warned them that Herod wanted to harm Jesus. Instead, they returned to their native country by a different route.

#### ICON OF THE FEAST

The icon of the Nativity tells the story of Christ's birth from the Scriptures. It also shows that all creation is taking part in Christ's birth. The angels give thanks with their song; the heavens give the star; the Wise Men give their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. The poor, humble shepherds give their praise and amazement; the earth gives the cave, and humanity gives the Virgin.

This Holy Icon is an icon with many scenes. First, it stresses the importance of the Theotokos, the Mother of Jesus. She is placed in the center and is the largest figure in the icon.

In this icon, she is kneeling with crossed arms, looking at the Christ child. The three stars, denoting her virginity before, during, and after the Nativity, are on her garments. The Christ Child, in the center of the icon, is in swaddling clothes and is lying in the manger. In the background is the dark cave where He was born. In the cave are an ox and a donkey guarding the newborn Babe. Even though the Gospels say nothing of the cave, this information is from Holy Tradition. Neither do the Gospels speak of the ox and the donkey, but all icons of the Nativity include these animals. Including the animals in the icon fulfills the prophecy of Isaiah 1:3, "The ox knows his master, and the donkey his master's crib; but Israel does not know me, and the people have not regarded me." The long ray of light from the star points directly to the cave. This ray comes from the star and travels to all parts of the world. It teaches that this bright star is an astronomical happening, and is a messenger from heaven announcing the birth of Jesus.

On the left hand side of the icon is another scene. The Wise Men, who were led by the star, are riding horses to bring their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh to Jesus. The Wise Men are of various ages. One is without a beard. In those days, young men did not wear beards. The other Wise Man has long hair and a long beard, which indicates that he is much older. These details teach that regardless of age and appearance, the Good News was given to each and everyone.

Opposite the Wise Men is the scene with the humble shepherds. An angel proclaims the glad tidings. A young shepherd plays a reed instrument. This scene reveals that the music of the humans was added to the hymn of the angels. Across from the shepherd's scene is the heavenly choir of angels. They are giving glory to God. The angels serve two purposes in the Nativity of Christ. They give glory to God and announce the good news to all mankind.

The background shows a very rugged terrain. This is not a true representation of

the land in this area. Joseph could not find room in Bethlehem, so they went outside of Bethlehem to a cave. This rocky mountain formation only serves as a background for the event.

In the lower part of the icon are two more scenes. In the right hand corner are the two women Joseph brought to take care of the Christ child. They are bathing Him just as any baby is bathed. The humanity of Jesus is clearly shown in this setting.

Opposite the bathing of Jesus scene sits a sad and worried Joseph. He is not part of the central group the Christ Child and the Theotokos. Joseph is not the natural father. Joseph is troubled and despondent. There is an old man talking to Joseph. The old man is Satan. Satan can appear in many forms. Here he is as an old man who is tempting Joseph and disturbing him. Satan is telling Joseph that virgin birth is impossible. He's telling Joseph that he's a fool if he believes this. This story comes to us from Holy Tradition. The sad Joseph shows us not only his personal predicament but the dilemma of all mankind the difficulty of accepting that which is "beyond words or reason."

The tree, which is in the middle of the lower part of the icon, is a symbol of the Tree of Jesse. This tree refers to Isaiah 11:1-2, "But a shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse, and from his roots a bud shall blossom. The spirit of the Lord shall rest upon Him." King David was often mentioned as the son of Jesse and Jesus was from the House of David.

The Holy Icon of the Nativity reminds one to praise and glorify the Birth of Christ. The celebration of Christmas each year serves to remind each and everyone of us that Christ came for you and me.

### THE ORTHODOX CELEBRATION OF THE FEAST OF THE NATIVITY

As with Pascha, or Easter, the Feast of the Nativity begins with a period of preparation. It is proceeded by a fast corresponding to Lent and lasting for forty days. The fast begins on November 15.

On the Sundays immediately before December 25, special commemorations emphasize the link between the Old Covenant and the New. On December 20 the Forefeast of the Nativity is commemorated, and the daily liturgical texts are directed toward the Feast itself. On Christmas Eve, services include the Great or Royal Hours, the Great Vespers, and the Liturgy of Saint Basil.

On Christmas Day the service commemorates the birth of Christ in Bethlehem, the adoration of the Shepherds, and the arrival of the Wise Men with their gifts. The service held on this day is the Liturgy of Saint John Chrysostom.

The days following Christmas are associated with the Theotokos and Joseph. December 26 is the Synaxis of the Mother of God, and the first Sunday after the Feast commemorates "Joseph the Betrothed." December 29 commemorates the Massacre of the Innocents, and January 1 the Circumcision of our Lord. The Nativity season concludes on December 31, but the spirit of the festival extends to the celebration of Theophany (Epiphany), the feast commemorating the Baptism of our Lord in the Jordan River.



### Archepiscopal Encyclical for National Philoptochos Sunday

November 17, 2024

Unto the Most Reverend and Right Reverend Hierarchs, Pious Priests and Deacons, the Monks and Nuns, Presidents and Members of Parish Councils, Honorable Archons of the Ecumenical Patriarchate, Members of Leadership 100, the Day and Afternoon Schools, Philoptochos Societies, the Youth, Greek Orthodox Organizations, and the entirety of the Christ-named Plenitude of the Holy Archdiocese of America:

Go, and do likewise. (Luke 10:37)

Beloved sisters and brothers in Christ,

On this National Philoptochos Sunday, when we remember the parable of the "Good Samaritan" that was read last Sunday, let us take inspiration from the final words that the Lord addresses to the lawyer who was trying to best Him in an argument. Ή σημεφινή Κυφιακή εἶναι ἀφιεφωμένη στὴν Ἐθνική μας Φιλόπτωχο Ἀδελφότητα καί, εὐκαιφίας δοθείσης, ἂς ξαναθυμηθοῦμε τὴν παφοβολὴ τοῦ «Καλοῦ Σαμαφείτη», ἡ ὁποία διαβάστηκε τὴν πεφασμένη Κυφιακή. Σὲ αὐτὴ τὴν παφαβολή, ὁ Κύφιος ἀπευθύνεται πφὸς κάποιο νομικό, ὁ ὁποῖος τὸν φωτάει γιὰ τὴ σωτηφία, λέγοντάς του (καὶ μέσω αὐτοῦ σὲ ὅλους ἐμᾶς): «ποφεύου καὶ σὺ καὶ ποίει ὁμοίως»! Γίνετε οἰκτίφμονες καὶ ἐλεήμονες! Αὐτὸ ἀκφιβῶς εἶναι τὸ νόημα τοῦ νὰ εἶσαι μέλος τῆς Φιλοπτώχου Ἀδελφότητος.

Τὰ κατὰ τόπους τμήματα τῆς Φιλοπτώχου Ἀδελφότητας, μὲ χιλιάδες μέλη, ἀδελφές μας ποὺ ἐργάζονται καὶ διακονοῦν μὲ ἀγάπη ἀνιδιοτελῶς πρὸς τὸν πλησίον, ἔχουν μαθητεύσει ἄριστα στὰ πόδια τοῦ Κυρίου μας Ἰησοῦ Χριστοῦ. Ὁ κεντρικὸς σκοπὸς τῶν διακονιῶν αὐτῶν εἶναι νὰ μιμηθοῦν τὸ παράδειγμα τοῦ «Καλοῦ Σαμαρείτη», δείχνοντας τὸ ἔλεος τοῦ Θεοῦ, συμπονώντας ὅποιον ἔχει ἀνάγκη.

Ἄς τὶς στηρίξουμε, λοιπόν, στὴ διακονία τους πρὸς τὸν πλησίον, γνωρίζοντας ὅτι καλύπτουν ἕνα μεγάλο κενὸ στὴν κοινωνία μας. Ἔχουν βάλει τὸ λόγο τοῦ Κυρίου στὴν καρδιά τους καὶ τὸν κάνουν πράξη. Ἁκόμη καὶ ἄν δὲν μποροῦμε νὰ εἴμαστε μαζὶ μὲ αὐτὲς στὴν πρώτη γραμμή, μποροῦμε νὰ προσφέρουμε τὸν ὀβολό μας πρὸς ἐνίσχυσή τους, ὥστε νὰ ἔχουν τοὺς ἀναγκαίους πόρους γιὰ νὰ «πορευθοῦν καὶ νὰ ποιήσουν ὁμοίως». We are all sons and daughters of the Mother Church of Constantinople, and we express our gratitude and appreciation to Her brave and devoted Archons for all that they accomplish on Her behalf. May they enjoy many years of health and spiritual prosperity!

# Stewardship Sunday

The word steward, as a noun, is a person who takes care of the people on a ship. It actually states that the steward is a person, to bring food to the people of the vessel. I find it interesting that it is a ship in the definition as in many instances Christ and the church is referred to as a ship. The very word nave, where we sit in the church, is from the Latin word navis, which means ship. Christ, the captain, has laid down his cross to form this ship. We understand this as churches are physically built like crosses.

However, before he laid down this cross, he chose the first twelve stewards to take care of the ship. Now they also had a special job because not only were they to take care of this upcoming ship, but they also had the responsibility to fill the ship by going out and preaching the gospel to the world.

We as Christians, as Orthodox Christians, have been chosen as well to continue the care of this ship of our Lord's. The Christian definition of the world's stewardship is a responsibility that we have as Orthodox Christians to maintain and wisely use the gifts that God has bestowed on us. Of course, monetarily, is the first thing we think of, but as stewards we also have to take care of the people in the ship, and we have to nourish and support one another. We can do this by trying to give our time with whatever talents we have that can possibly benefit the church and the people.

The Epistle readings are examples of this. The various disciples write letters telling how they are ministering to all the early churches. They travel from church to church. They record what they have done. They mention names of the new Christians who are coming and going, bringing support to one another, to the different parishes. They instruct how a parish should receive these visitors and help them and care for them. In my



mind I see it as a time of bustling activity and growth. Of course things did not happen as fast as we read them now. If it was not for the tenacity and love they had for our Lord, these early stewards, we would have not had our Apostolic history and succession!

The word steward, as a verb, means to manage another's property. Christ left us with his precious ship! Our beautiful Orthodox church and faith. We must take care of his property. and we must nourish it with whatever time and talents and gifts that we have, that we can share. Just like our chosen first 12 stewards, we have the same job in all aspects to do.

In a final note, let us go back to the Old Testament for a moment. This is when the world was misbehaving and God instructed Noah to build the ark to save his family and all the creatures of creation. I'm adding this note, because this was the first ship of salvation. God did not want his work totally destroyed, but things were getting too much for him to bear. We cannot even imagine how his heart was pained, because after all he is the creator. So because of his great love for his creation he saves it. He chooses Noah and his family to be the new stewards of his plan and to move forward to the coming of Our Savior Jesus Christ to fulfill the gift of our salvation! Then he chooses us to be the stewards! He chooses us to continue the good work that was created when he laid down his cross for the foundation of the ship! May we all find the true desire and strength to offer whatever stewardship we can to keep our ship floating for all our generations to come.



#### **Boasting in the Cross**

### Have you ever bragged about some-

thing? Maybe you won a game. Or maybe you got a toy that nobody else got. Or maybe you got the best grade in your class. Sometimes it's hard to keep from bragging and boasting when something good happens to you.

In today's epistle though, Saint Paul tells us we shouldn't boast and brag about these things. Saint Paul tells us he boasts about only one thing, and that thing is what our Lord Jesus Christ has done for us.



Saint Paul writes, "But God forbid that I should boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world." Saint Paul had a lot to boast about. He was one of the best helpers the Church had. He was really great, and he had a ton of followers. He could have boasted about how great he was. But he didn't.

Good things happen to us all the time, and we may be happy about them. But the thing that we can boast about is how Christ died on the Cross for us so we can have life forever with Him. That's what we can boast about!

When we boast about Christ's Cross, we tell other people about the Good News. When we boast about Christ's Cross, we aren't showing off what we did, but we're showing off what Christ did. Let's boast like Saint Paul did!

### SAINT KATHERINE STANDING UP FOR THE FAITH

#### When you think of a strong

person, who do you think of? A weight lifter? A super hero? Today we remember a saint who reminds us all to be strong people, not with our muscles but with our faith! She reminds us to be strong Christians. Saint Katherine lived many, many years ago, when Christians were not allowed to be Christians-or at least not out in the open.

But Saint Katherine knew that it was more important to be on God's side than to be on

the emperor's side. So, Katherine visited the emperor and told him she was a Christian. She told him why he was wrong to believe in idols. She told the emperor the only God was her God-the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit!

The emperor was really angry then! He brought together 50 of the smartest men around-to show Katherine SHE was wrong. But Saint Katherine, who was only a teenager, convinced these men that her God was the true God-not their silly idols. When these men became Christians too, that was too much for the emperor.

He ordered Saint Katherine to be awfully hurt and to be killed. But all the time, Saint Katherine was strong in her faith. And for that, she is a saint in


