The topic of my message is a message of hope. I pray that when you read this article it can give everyone an understanding why we are here living on this Earth. This Earth that we live in is made up of many different People, Nations, Customs, and Traditions. In a few words, WE ARE A MELTING POT, living side by side of each other, and in reality most of us don't know our next door neighbor.

I will tell you a story that describes what we as humans are, one way or another.

There was a very lost, wicked, and rebellious man who decided it would be good for business if he went down to the church and joined it. He was an adulterer, an alcoholic, and had never been a member of a church in his life. But when he went down to place membership, he gave public testimony to the church that there was no sin in his life, and that he had grown up in the church, and they readily accepted him as a member.

When he went home he told his wife what he had done, and his wife, a very Godly lady, exploded. She condemned him for being a hypocrite, and demanded that he go back to the church the next week and confess what he really was. Well, God used his wife to really break him, and he took it to heart.

The next Sunday he went back to church, walked down to the front again, and this time confessed to the

church all his sins. He told them that he was dishonest, and alcoholic, an adulterer, and that he was truly sorry. After all that, the people of the church revoked his membership on the spot. He walked out of the church that day scratching his head and muttered to himself: "These church folks are really strange. I told a lie and they took me in; and when I told the truth they kicked me out."

Sometimes, I ask myself the same question - Why couldn't this man after all he went through in life, come up to the plate and tell his story the way it happened the first time? Because we live in a society that can't accept the truth. We live in a storybook society where everything is perfect, because that's what we want - TO LIVE IN A PERFECT WORLD, OR A MAKE-BELIEVE WORLD. Everybody sees life the way they want to see it. Since you are reading this article, let me ask you some questions: Do you always tell the truth at all times? Don't we all have a skeleton in our closets? Don't we all want to forget the past and walk away from it? Do you ever look at people who don't go to church, and think you are better than they are because you go to church? Because of your position and status, do you look down on other people, thinking that you are better than they are? Do you ever look at people who divorced, and think that you are better than they are because you are not?

I promise you, everyone one of you will find yourself somewhere in this story, because at one time or another, all of us are guilty of trying to impress God.

The message that God gives us today is that He offers us a new life and a new beginning. But to reach that point we need to look at ourselves and re-evaluate what we have done wrong in the past and correct it. Throughout history we have plenty examples of the great leaders of the church who lived there lives in sinfulness. We all know the story of St. Paul, what he was before he walked away from his sinful past. He persecuted and killed Christians. But as soon he accepted Christ, he became the greatest apostle of the church. If we look at Noah, Abraham, & Moses, all

People today crave for new things. New phones, new cars, homes, clothing, and etc. We are in an economic recession because of our wants and needs. We try to put the blame on others, but in reality we play a major role in the destruction of our economy. It's about time that we take full responsibility for our actions. So, the key word here is "CHANGE." The question is "CAN WE CHANGE?"

The answer is "YES WE CAN." I am not taking a political stand here in repeating the words that some politicians use for their own personal gains. When I say that "WE CAN" I really mean it. When you have faith, you can conquer anything that you put your mind to. I have always believed in the three positive words, "MIND OVER MATTER." 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Holy Pentecost June 23

fter the Saviour's Ascension into the AHeavens, the eleven Apostles and the rest of His disciples, the God-loving women who followed after Him from the beginning, His Mother, the most holy Virgin Mary, and His brethren-all together about 120 souls returned from the Mount of Olives to Jerusalem. Entering into the house where they gathered, they went into the upper room, and there they persevered in prayer and supplication, awaiting the coming of the Holy Spirit, as their Divine Teacher had promised them. In the meanwhile, they chose Matthias, who was elected to take the place of Judas among the Apostles.

Thus, on this day, the seventh Sunday of Pascha, the tenth day after the Ascension and the fiftieth day after Pascha, at the third hour of the day from the rising of the sun, there suddenly came a sound from Heaven, as when a mighty wind blows, and it filled the whole house where the Apostles and the rest with them were gathered. Immediately after the sound, there appeared tongues of fire that divided and rested upon the head of each one. Filled with the Spirit, all those present began speaking not in their native tongue, but in other tongues and dialects, as the Holy Spirit instructed them.

The multitudes that had come together from various places for the feast, most of whom were Jews by race and religion, were called Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and so forth, according to the places where they dwelt. Though they spoke many different tongues, they were present in Jerusalem by divine dispensation. When they heard that sound that came down from Heaven to the place where the disciples of Christ were gathered, all ran together to learn what had taken place. But they were confounded when they came and heard the Apostles speaking in their own tongues. Marvelling at this, they said one to another, "Behold, are not all these which speak Galileans? And how

hear we every man in our own tongue, wherein we were born?" But others, because of their foolishness and excess of evil, mocked the wonder and said that the Apostles were drunken.

Then Peter stood up with the eleven, and raising his voice, spoke to all the people, proving that that which had taken place was not drunkenness, but the fulfilment of God's promise that had been spoken by the Prophet Joel: "And it shall come to pass in the last days, that I shall pour out of My Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and daughters shall prophesy" (Joel 2:28), and he preached Jesus of Nazareth unto them, proving in many ways that He is Christ the Lord, Whom the Jews crucified but God raised from the dead. On hearing Peter's teaching, many were smitten with compunction and received the word. Thus, they were baptized, and on that day about three thousand souls were added to the Faith of Christ.

Such, therefore, are the reasons for today's feast: the coming of the All-holy Spirit into the world, the completion of the Lord Jesus Christ's promise, and the fulfilment of the hope of the sacred disciples, which we celebrate today. This is the final feast of the great mystery and dispensation of God's incarnation. On this last, and great, and saving day of Pentecost, the Apostles of the Saviour, who were unlearned fishermen, made wise now of a sudden by the Holy Spirit, clearly and with divine authority spoke the heavenly doctrines. They became heralds of the truth and teachers of the whole world. On this day they were ordained and began their apostleship, of which the salvation of those three thousand souls in one day was the comely and marvellous first fruit.

Some erroneously hold that Pentecost is the "birthday of the Church." But this is not true, for the teaching of the holy Fathers is that the Church existed before all other things. In the second vision of



The Shepherd of Hermas we read: "Now brethren, a revelation was made unto me in my sleep by a youth of exceeding fair form, who said to me, 'Whom thinkest thou the aged woman, from whom thou receivedst the book, to be?' I say, 'The Sibyl.' 'Thou art wrong,' saith he, 'she is not.' 'Who then is she?' I say. 'The Church,' saith he. I said unto him, 'Wherefore then is she aged?' 'Because,' saith he, 'she was created before all things; therefore is she aged, and for her sake the world was framed." Saint Gregory the Theologian also speaks of "the Church of Christ ... both before Christ and after Christ" (PG 35:1108-9). Saint Epiphanius of Cyprus writes, "The Catholic Church, which exists from the ages, is revealed most clearly in the incarnate advent of Christ" (PG 42:640). Saint John Damascene observes, "The Holy Catholic Church of God, therefore, is the assembly of the holy Fathers, Patriarchs, Prophets, Apostles, Evangelists, and Martyrs who have been from the very beginning, to whom were added all the nations who believed with one accord" (PG 96, 1357c). According to Saint Gregory the Theologian, "The Prophets established the Church, the Apostles conjoined it, and the Evangelists set it in order" (PG 35, 589 A). The Church existed from the creation of the

Angels, for the Angels came into existence before the creation of the world, and they have always been members of the Church. Saint Clement, Bishop of Rome, says in his second epistle to the Corinthians, the Church "was created before the sun and moon"; and a little further on, "The Church existeth not now for the first time, but hath been from the beginning" (II Cor. 14).

That which came to pass at Pentecost, then, was the ordination of the Apostles, the commencement of the apostolic preaching to the nations, and the inauguration of the priesthood of the new Israel. Saint Cyril of Alexandria says that "Our Lord Jesus Christ herein ordained the instructors and teachers of the world and the stewards of His divine Mysteries ... showing together with the dignity of Apostleship, the incomparable glory of the authority given them ... Revealing them to be splendid with the great dignity of the Apostleship and showing them forth as both stewards and priests of the divine altars . . . they became fit to initiate others through the enlightening guidance of the Holy Spirit" (PG 74, 708-712). Saint Gregory Palamas says, "Now, therefore ... the Holy Spirit descended ... showing the Disciples to be supernal luminaries ... and the distributed grace of the Divine Spirit came through the ordination of the Apostles upon their successors" (Homily 24, 10). And Saint Sophronius, Bishop of Jerusalem, writes, "After the visitation of the Comforter, the Apostles became high priests" (PG 87, 3981B). Therefore, together with the baptism of the Holy Spirit which came upon them who were present in the upper chamber, which the Lord had foretold as recorded in the Acts, "ye shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days hence" (Acts 1:5), the Apostles were also appointed and raised to the high priestly rank, according to Saint John Chrysostom (PG 60, 21). On this day commenced the celebration of the Holy Eucharist by which we become "partakers of the Divine Nature" (II Peter

1:4). For before Pentecost, it is said of the Apostles and disciples only that they abode in "prayer and supplication" (Acts 1:14); it is only after the coming of the Holy Spirit that they persevered in the "breaking of bread,"that is, the communion of the Holy Mysteries-"and in prayer" (Acts 2:42).

The feast of holy Pentecost, therefore, determined the beginning of the priesthood of grace, not the beginning of the Church. Henceforth, the Apostles proclaimed the good tidings "in country and town," preaching and baptizing and appointing shepherds, imparting the priesthood to them whom they judged were worthy to minister, as Saint Clement writes in his first Epistle to the Corinthians (I Cor. 42).

Sunday of All Saints

Honouring the friends of God with much reverence, the Prophet-King David says, "But to me, exceedingly honourable are Thy friends, O Lord" (Ps. 138:16). And the divine Apostle, recounting the achievements of the Saints, and setting forth their memorial as an example that we might turn away from earthly things and from sin, and emulate their patience and courage in the struggles for virtue, says, "Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every burden, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us" (Heb. 12:1).

This commemoration began as the Sunday (Synaxis) of All Martyrs; to them were added all the ranks of Saints who bore witness (the meaning of "Martyr" in Greek) to Christ in manifold ways, even if occasion did not require the shedding of their blood.

Therefore, guided by the teaching of the Divine Scriptures and Apostolic Tradition, we the pious honour all the Saints, the friends of God, for they are keepers of God's commandments, shining examples of virtue, and benefactors of mankind. Of course, we honour the known Saints especially on their own day of the year, as is evident in the Menologion. But since many Saints are unknown, and their number has increased with time, and will continue to increase until the end of time, the Church has appointed that once a year a common commemoration be made of all the Saints. This is the feast that we celebrate today. It is the harvest of the coming of the Holy Spirit into the world; it is the "much fruit" brought forth by that "Grain of wheat that fell into the earth and died" (John 12:24); it is the glorification of the Saints as "the foundation of the Church, the perfection of the Gospel, they who fulfilled in deed the sayings of the Saviour" (Sunday of All Saints, Doxasticon of Vespers).

In this celebration, then, we reverently honour and call blessed all the Righteous, the Prophets, Apostles, Martyrs, Confessors, Shepherds, Teachers, and Holy Monastics, both men and women alike, known and unknown, who have been added to the choirs of the Saints and shall be added, from the time of Adam until the



end of the world, who have been perfected in piety and have glorified God by their holy lives. All these, as well as the orders of the Angels, and especially our most holy Lady and Queen, the Ever-virgin Theotokos Mary, do we honour today, setting their life before us as an example of virtue, and entreating them to intercede in our behalf with God, Whose grace and boundless mercy be with us all. Amen.

Archepiscopal Encyclical on the National Sisterhood of Presvyteres Sunday

June 2, 2024

Unto the Most Reverend and Right Reverend Hierarchs, Pious Priests and Deacons, Presvyteres and Diakonisses, Monks and Nuns, Presidents and Members of the Parish Councils, Honorable Archons of the Ecumenical Patriarchate, Members of Leadership 100, Day and Afternoon Schools, Philoptochos Societies, Youth, Greek Orthodox Organizations, and entirety of the Christ-loving Plenitude of the Sacred Archdiocese of America:

Come! See a man who told me everything I have ever done! Could this be the Christ? (*John 4:29*)

My beloved sisters and brothers in Christ,

Christ is Risen!

The fact that this year's National Sisterhood of Presvyteres Sunday falls on the Sunday of the Samaritan Woman is most auspicious, indeed. For in the narrative of Saint Photini, who was ultimately martyred for her faith with her companions, we behold a wisdom-holder of the highest order, even though her beginnings were less than ideal — certainly far less than those wondrous women of our Church who are the spouses of our clergy.





As we enter into another productive year, we cannot afford to rest on our laurels. As a community we have a lot of work to do, the groundwork has been started, and we must work even harder to promote a better Christian environment for ourselves and our children. God has blessed our community with parishioners like you, who have supported the church throughout the years. But to continue this success that we have experienced, we need to focus on something very important. We need to understand what "STEWARDSHIP" means.

Our main concern in writing this letter is to have a better communication with the members of our St. Demetrios family. Somewhere down the line we have forgotten what it means to be a Good Standing Member of the Church. 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Pastoral Thoughts

No one will be able to meet Christ on the Journey to Pascha unless they are walking the right path. Having the right frame of mind for this journey is indispensable to its success. Someone planning to visit an island must first understand that he must either take a plane as or a boat and not a bus or a train. But a right mental attitude is not enough. It is not sufficient to know with firm mind that to reach the island you have to fly or take a boat, but one has to act accordingly. It won't do to "know" you have to take a boat and not to buy a ticket for the train.

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Christ is "one" person even though there are several ways that people can reach Him. Our meeting with Christ will depend on the degree that the Christ we are seeking is the real Christ. The correct belief of "who" and "what" is Christ is absolutely necessary to our "beginning" of our journey to meet Him, and this "beginning" must be followed with a "living" in which our whole being participates.

All too often, with our thoughts and words we refer to Christ, but our lives refer to an all together different Christ. We can describe with words our God as a loving father who "emptied Himself" and became man for us, His children, while at the same time to be tormented by feelings of guilt over our sins and by fear of the punishment that will be imposed upon us unmercifully. We might say with words that only the grace of God saves us while simultaneously basing our salvation on good works. The person who follows the right path for a meeting with the Risen Christ must now be assured that this journey is based on a correct belief about who this Christ is that we want to meet.

Man cannot meet Christ so long as Satan is in his heart as Jesus says, "this generation (Satan and his demons) cannot pass away without prayer and fasting."(Matthew 17:21) Prayer and fasting are the means by which man will clean his heart to meet Christ there. Prayer is not a request for gifts, it is not a means whereby we transform God into a servant and demand that He speedily satisfy our desires. It is almost a blasphemy for one to tell God what to give because when we do this we suggest that we know something that God doesn't, and that we are smarter than He. When we do this we truly don't believe in God. Real prayer is for man to ask for nothing other than God Himself, "...the Kingdom of God and His righteousness ... " and all other things that we really need will be given to us without asking. (Matt.6:33)

Real prayer is an expression of love that seeks only the object of our love. Such a prayer is prayed, "...with sighs too deep for words." (Romans. δ :26) When we seek with warm prayer, the resurrected Christ will appear before us just as He appeared before Mary and the eleven disciples "while the doors were shut." He will appear in all His glory to us if we will be as were His disciples, "...constantly devoting themselves to prayer..."

I ask you, therefore, dear faithful, to please continue your devotion, your vigilance, your prayers, and your attendance, to say the least, to the various spiritual services that our Church has scheduled for the remainder of the Great Lent period. And to open our hearts and our lives to our most Loving and forgiving Lord, for but the glorious Resurrection is only a few weeks away. Let us be prepared correctly spiritually and physically for that.

Pastoral Thoughts Translated into Greek

Κανείς δεν θα δυνηθεί ν'ανταμωθεί με τον Χριστό καθ'οδό προς το Αγιο Πάσχα, αν δεν διανύσει τον ορθό δρόμο. Η επιτυχία του ταξιδιού του εξαρτάται από την πνευματική του ετοιμότητα. Ενας που σκοπεύει να επισκεφθεί κάποιο νησί, πρέπει να αντιληφθεί πρώτα πως πρέπει να πάρει αεροπλάνο ή πλοίο και όχι αυτοκίνητο ή τρένο! Αλλά η σωστή πνευματική διάθεση δεν είναι αρκετή προυπόθεση! Δεν είναι αρκετό να γνωρίζεις πως για να φθάσεις σ'ενα νησί θα πρέπει να ταξιδέψεις με πλοίο ή αεροπλάνο. Θα πρέπει να ενεργήσεις ανάλογα.

Μπορούμε να σαν γαρακτηρίζουμε τον Θεό ένα Ελεήμονα Πατέρα που κατέβηκε σαν άνθρωπος στη γη για μας τα παιδιά Του, ενώ συγχρόνως ταλαιπωρούμεθα από ενοχή για τις αμαρτίες μας και από το φόβο της τιμωρίας. Ενώ λέμε πως η σωτηρία μας εξαρτάται από την μεγαλοψυχία του Θεού, συγχρόνως βασιζόμαστε στις αγαθοεργικές μας πράξεις για την σωτηρία μας.

Ο Χριστιανός που ακολουθεί τον σωστό δρόμο για την συνάντηση του με τον Αναστημένο Χριστό πρέπει να είναι βέβαιος πως αυτό το ταξίδι είναι βασισμένο στην

ορθή κατανόηση του Χριστού που θέλει ν'ανταμώσει.

Κανείς δεν μπορεί ν' ανταμώσει τον Χριστό αν έχει τον Σατανά στην καρδιά του, όπως μας λέει ο ίδιος ο Χριστόςς, «αυτή η γενεά (ο Σατανάς με τα δαιμόνια του) δεν θα εξαφανιστεί χωρίς την προσευχή και την νηστεία.» (Ματθαίος17:21) Η προσευχή και η νηστεία είναι τα μέσα με τα οποία ο άνθρωπος θα εξαγνίσει την ψυχή του για ν'ανταμώσει τον Χριστό. Η προσευχή δεν είναι παράκληση για δώρα, ούτε πρεπει να έγει σαν σκοπό την ικανοποίηση των επιθυμιών μας. Είναι σχεδόν ιεροσυλία να εισηγηθούμε προς τον Θεό τί θα πρέπει να αυτό σημαίνει πως μας δώσει, γιατί θεωρούμε τον εαυτό μας εξυπνότερο απ' Εκείνον! Η πραγματική προσευχή δεν πρέπει να έχει άλλο σκοπό από την αναζήτηση του Θεού. «Η Βασιλεία του Θεού, η δικαιοσύνη Του..» και ότι άλλο έγουμε ανάγκη θα μας παραχωρηθούν χωρις να το έχουμε ζητήσει. (Ματθαίος 6:33)

Η πραγματική προσευχή είναι έκφραση αγάπης με την οποία αναζητούμε το αντικείμενο της λατρείας μας. Μια τέτοια γίνεται, «... με βαθείς προσευχή αναστεναγμούς...» (Ρωμαίους 8:26). HEALTHY BODY AND MIND

ARE PLANT MILKS RIGHT FOR YOU?



Noticed the growing number of beverages in your grocery store's dairy case? These "milks" don't contain dairy at all; instead, they are made from plant foods such as coconut, almonds, cashews, oats, soy and rice. We're often told that dairy products are the best source of calcium and vitamin D, which support strong bones and healthy teeth. So why all these new options?

For some, the answer simply comes down to personal preference. However, there are also considerable health concerns driving this nondairy trend. An estimated 30 million American adults cannot digest lactose, the natural sugar found in dairy products. These people experience gas, diarrhea or bloating after consuming cow's milk. And approximately 6 million Americans - predominantly children - are allergic to cow's milk, a condition that can require emergency medical treatment. The Physicians Committee for Responsible Medicine asserts that the saturated fat found in cow's milk can increase the risk of heart disease and certain cancers. Additionally, based on ethical and environmental concerns, some Americans opt to avoid animal products in favor of a vegan lifestyle.

However, other people simply prefer the taste, creaminess and versatility of cow's milk. Like plant milk, it comes in a variety of flavors and fat contents. Lactose-free options and supplemental enzymes are also available for those who are lactose intolerant. These are easy to find at convenience and grocery stores. They can also be a more economical choice, with some plant milks costing twice as much. Regardless of which milk you prefer, it is always important to read labels. Plant milks are made by soaking the chosen nut, bean or grain, grinding that material with water, and then adding flavorings, nutrients and often sugar. This means some milks are high in sugar, or lack the amounts of calcium, vitamin D, protein and vitamin B12 that make dairy so valuable. Look for plant milk that is fortified with at least 250 mg calcium and 2.5 mcg vitamin D. Also, choose unsweetened options, preferably with less than 12 grams of sugar per cup.

NOT ALWAYS "GREEN"

Scores of everyday cleaning products—even socalled green products—emit hazardous volatile organic compounds (VOCs), according to an Environmental Working Group study published in the journal Chemosphere.

As HealthDay reports, the study looked at multipurpose cleaners, glass cleaners and air fresheners. Researchers detected 530 unique VOCs, including 193 that could damage the respiratory system, increase cancer risk, and/or increase risk of developmental and reproductive problems.

Products labeled "green" were found to emit about half as many VOCs, and fragrance-free options emitted nearly eight times fewer VOCs than conventional cleaners.

According to the study, VOCs have been associated with a higher incidence of several breathing-related conditions.

"Those in the cleaning industry have a 50% higher asthmarisk," HealthDay reports. "They also have a 43% higher risk of chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, or COPD. Women who do this work also have a greater risk of lung cancer."

In addition, higher use of certain indoor cleaners appears to affect fetuses and infants, and is associated with a greater risk of asthma and wheezing in childhood.

HAVE "THE TALK" ABOUT ESTATE PLANNING, FINANCES



Earlier this morning, I wrote a check to my mom's memory care center.

WHO YOU WANT DOING WHAT

Whether you're naming an agent to make decisions for you in the event you can't, selecting an executor or successor trustee to manage things when you're gone, or choosing someone for something as mundane as taking care of your pets, you've got a reason and rationale for picking who you pick. Get it out there to set expectations and prevent conflict.




YOUR TEAM AND CONTACTS

Have a letter of instruction documenting your key contacts (attorneys, accountants), providers (banks, brokerages, insurance companies) and social media account details in a single document or notebook. If not, get it done. Include the details of any special programs or services for which you're eligible. Perhaps you've gone through the VA pre-need burial eligibility process and have documentation showing it. Let those who will need the info know where it's kept.

YOUR INSURANCE

Your life, disability, long-term care and health insurance have direct or indirect effects on your dayto-day finances as well as your estate plan. Do you have any gaps or concerns when it comes to insurance? Maybe you have long-term care or life insurance that has become too expensive but could still provide valuable protection. Getting it out in the open could invite solutions that benefit the entire family.

Your special instructions This is an opportunity to share details on a wide variety of topics, such as preferred burial location, cremation, type of service and obituary details. Don't let my lack of imagination limit yours.

FIGHTING FOR ICONS SAINT NIKEPHOROS THE CONFESSOR

Do you love icons so much that

you would fight for them? If you saw somebody putting them down and stomping on them, would you fight for them?

Well, Saint Nikephoros did! Saint Nikephoros was born many years ago, in the year 758. At that time the emperors seemed to go back and forth between loving icons or hating them. For a few years the people would have an emperor or empress who protected icons, and then for a few years they would have a ruler who hated them and wanted them all destroyed!



Saint Nikephoros wrote three great works to explain why the Church must have icons! Later on, Nikephoros became the Patriarch of Constantinople, but unfortunately the emperor at the time was a terrible icon-hater. He hated icons so much that he punished people who defended them! Saint Nikephoros fought for icons, even though the emperor sent people to secretly attack and kill him. This didn't happen, but finally the emperor sent the holy saint away into exile, where he was forced to live away from his church flock. That way, the emperor wouldn't have to listen to his warnings and advice!

Saint Nikephoros died in exile, but our Church remembers his courage and how he loved icons so much that he fought for them!

Concerning the use of One's Tongue

A quaint, old Jewish story tells of a king who gave his jester the following difficult command. "Go out and buy the very best thing in the world". Moreover, a very short time later, the returned and presented the king with a package.

Unwrapping the package, the king noted that it contained a tongue. He thus carefully thought about the contents of this package, and finally praised the jester for having chosen so wisely saying: "Indeed, the tongue is the best thing in the world."

A short time passed, and the king once again summoned the jester, and gave him and equally difficult assignment. "Now, good servant," said the king. "I would like you to go out and search for the worst thing in the world. And when you find it, bring it back to me as you did before."

Hearing this, the jester obeyed his master and soon returned with another package. Unwrapping the package, the king again found another tongue. And again the king stopped for a moment and pensively considered the contents of this package, finally saying: "Indeed, good and wise servant, the tongue is the worst thing in the world."

The point behind this story is simple. With out tongues we can praise or curse. In short, the gift of speech can contribute greatly toward man's glory or lend greatly toward his demise. As such, it is no wonder that the ancients feared those who were articulate more than those who possessed great physical prowess.

Indeed! The tongue has tremendous destructive power. It can cast vicious rumors and evil half truths about that cripple and destroy. With the tongue wars begin, reputations are destroyed, emotional wounds are made that are hard to heal.

Like a venomous snake, it might well be suggested that the tongue carries venom that kills. Make no mistake about it, words kill: They kill love, they kill joy, they kill peace, they kill trust, they kill healthy ambition and a good name. And yes, they can kill Christian families, Christian friendship and even Christian communities.

It is thus, no wonder, that when we speak about others in a malicious manner; when we encourage rumors, gossip, and half-truths, we grieve our God. For through such activity, we separate ourselves from God and His Grace. That is why Saint Paul wrote to the Ephesians saying, "Let no evil talk come out your mouths ... but only such as is good and edifying ... Let all bitterness and wrath and anger and clamor and slander be put away from you ... be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving, as God in Christ forgave you."

Pray, therefore, each day, that Christ, through the power of the Holy Spirit, gives you the strength to follow Him. For therein you will find the law of love, and the needed Christian self-control to hold back the malicious remark, the harsh answer and harmful rumors; therein you will be graced with the need insight to use your tongue to God's glory and your salvation.
