
In closing during the holiday season we know that thousands of families are going to be without food and other general necessities. When we help those in need, our Lord Jesus Christ will reward us a hundredfold.



A Feast of the Entrance into The Temple of Our Most Holy Lady The Theotokos November 21

INTRODUCTION

The Feast of the Entrance into the Temple of Our Most Holy Lady the Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary is celebrated on November 21 each year. The Feast commemorates when as a young child, the Virgin Mary entered the Temple in Jerusalem.

PROTEVANGELION STORY

The birth and early life of the Virgin Mary is not recorded in the Gospels or other books of the New Testament, however this information can be found in a work dating from the second century known as the Book of James or Protevangelion.

When Mary was three years old, Joachim and Anna decided that the time had come to fulfill their promise and to offer her to the Lord. Joachim gathered the young girls of the neighborhood to form an escort, and he made them go in front of Mary, carrying torches. Captivated by the torches, the young child followed joyfully to the Temple, not once looking back at her parents nor weeping as she was parted from them.

The holy Virgin ran toward the Temple, overtaking her attendant maidens and threw herself into the arms of the High Priest Zacharias, who was waiting for her at the gate of the Temple with the elders. Zacharias blessed her saying, "It is in you that He has glorified your name in every generation. It is in you that He will reveal the Redemption that He has prepared for His people in the last days."

Then, Zacharias brought the child into the Holy of Holies—a place where only the High Priest was permitted to enter once a year on the Day of Atonement. He placed her on the steps of the altar, and the grace of the Lord descended upon her. She arose and expressed her joy in a dance as wonder seized all who saw this happen.

The Virgin Mary dwelt in the Temple for nine years until, reaching an age for marriage, she was taken from the Temple by the priests and elders and entrusted to Joseph as the guardian of her virginity.

The Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple signifies her total dedication to God and her readiness for her future vocation as the Mother of the Incarnate Lord. This is a feast of anticipation. As honor is shown to Mary, the faithful are called to look forward to the Incarnation of Christ, celebrated in a little more than a month by the Feast of the Nativity on December 25.

ICON OF THE FEAST

The icon of the feast tells the story of Mary's entry into the Temple. The High Priest, Zacharias, is in his priestly robes standing on the step of the Temple. His arms are outstretched, ready to greet and receive the Virgin. Mary is shown as a small child, standing before Zacharias with her arms reaching up to him. In some icons the young maidens who served as her escort are depicted standing behind her. Also, we see her parents, Joachim and Anna, offering their child to God and His divine service. In the upper center portion of the icon, the Virgin is seated on the steps of the Holy of Holies. An angel is there, attending to the one chosen by God to bring the Savior into the world.

The Entry of The Theotokos Into the Temple November 21

The story of the entry of the Theotokos into the Temple is found in the book of the *Protevangelion of James*. The Orthodox Church celebrates this event on November 21.

Mary's parents, Joachim and Anna, were very religious. They had promised that they would dedicate their child to God. The custom, at that time, was that all children who were dedicated to God, were taken to the Temple when they were three years old. There they were taught and cared for by the holy men and women of the Temple. These children stayed in the Temple for twelve years where they received an excellent education. Many young virgins and aged widows lived in the Temple. These widows had dedicated their lives to the service of the Lord. They studied the Word of God and taught others.

When Mary was three years old, Joachim and Anna took their daughter to the Temple. She was to be separated from her parents. To prepare Mary for her trip to the Temple, her father, Joachim called the young girls of the neighborhood together. He gave each one a lighted candle and had them walk in front of Mary. The three year old Mary was so excited to see the candles that she followed them to the Temple. Not once did she look back to her parents, nor did she cry when she left her parents. Her parents wanted her to go happily to the Temple.


When they arrived at the Temple, the High Priest Zacharias greeted Mary. Zacharias took Mary into the Temple and into the Holy of Holies. The Holy of Holies was a very special place of the Temple. Only Zacharias, the High Priest, had the right to enter the Holy of Holies and he could only do this once a year. The High Priest Zacharias took Mary into the Holy of Holies, because he, like other prophets, understood what God had planned for His people. Zacharias knew that Mary was to become the Mother of Jesus, our Savior.

The icon tells the story of Mary's entry into the Temple. The High Priest Zacharias, in his priestly robes, is standing on the step of the Temple greeting the young child. Mary, is painted as a small child. She is standing before Zacharias with her arms reaching up to him.

The young girls who escorted her to the Temple are behind her. Joachim and Anna are presenting their child to Zacharias.

At the upper left of the Holy Icon, Mary, the Theotokos is sitting on the highest step. This indicates the Holy of Holies. An angel is there to assist her.

This story of Mary's entry to the Temple shows her dedication and devotion to God. In addition, it shows that she is willing to accept the awesome task as the Mother of our Lord. From this icon we understand that God was with her from a very early time of her life:


These Elections will take place on the second Sunday of December 2023. Mark this date on your calendars and come to church ready to vote for the new members of the Parish Council.



PASTORAL THOUGHTS

A Reflection On Parenthood

Without a doubt, one of the most challenging and yet most rewarding experiences in life is to be a parent. Helping your children grow and mature is truly a gift from God worthy to be treasured. Yet, as many parents know, it may not always feel that way. It can be very difficult at times, especially when you see your kids hurting...and no matter what you do, you just can't seem to help them.

Parenting includes more than just those who have children born to them. Rather, because of the influence we can and do have on many young people – whether we have children or not – each and every one of us is a parent too. So this day, let us reflect on the parental characteristics that every "parent" should have.

I begin by saying that I am very confident that none of us would ever intentionally hurt or injure a child. And I believe that, many times, negative experiences in a child's life can be directly attributed to parents who didn't know any better.

Let me give you an example. One recent morning on WFAN (Sports Talk Radio), they were discussing coaching tactics in Little League baseball. One mother called in and said that her son had been completely humiliated by his coach.

Apparently her son had been on the team and had not been playing as much as he was supposed to. He talked about it with his parents, and in an effort to help him solve his own problems, they discussed the situation with him and encouraged him to go respectfully to the coach to speak to him about his concern. He did that, and it seemed that things did change for a while.

At the end of the season, however, the coach held a pizza party for the team and gave out some of his own personal awards. The boy and his parents were in shock when the coach proudly announced to the team that the boy had been chosen to receive the "Cry Baby" award for not getting enough playing time during the season. You can only imagine the impact that this had on that boy.

And it doesn't stop there. How many times have we heard or even personally experienced parents making poor decisions and tremendously impacting their own kids. I have seen parents forbid their child to decorate his own room because some religious extremist told them that to do so would be teaching children idolatry. This child grew up without a sense of creativity and could not make decisions in his adult life without calling his parents for affirmation.



There are parents who control the long-term aspirations of their teenage children, deciding for them not only where they would go to college (threatening not to pay for college if they don't obey) but also going so far as to tell them what their major area of study was to be. The result in this situation is animosity toward the parents manifested in one of two ways – either through deep depression or by living an unrestrained lifestyle without concern for consequences.





We know that children are not born with instructions, and quite frankly, it can be very difficult to raise them – never mind when they are not our own. But we must understand that whether we are their mother or father, grandparent, aunt, uncle, coach, older friend – whatever we are to them – we have a tremendous influence not only on who they are now, but ultimately on who they will become.

For this reason, I offer three basic rules when dealing with young people. First, keep them involved in the life of the Church. Surround them constantly with activities in the community of faith. This is important not only for their salvation, but if children grow up in the Church, they will have a place to turn in times of trouble, and will feel comfortable coming to the priest or another Christian adult to share their difficulties.

Second, always let them know that you have a listening ear. You have to be able to listen to your children without judgment, and they need to know that you will not use it against them later on. Do not keep a record of their wrongs. Just listen to them patiently and allow them to express themselves. You don't have to solve all their problems. Being a good listener for your children will allow them to think out loud and often to find solutions on their own.

Finally and most importantly, don't pretend to have all the answers. Do not act like an expert on life! Do not think that you know everything there is to know about your children. Don't compare your life to their life. And don't use the phrase that your parents may have used, "TI THA PEI O KOSMOS" – "What will people say?" When situations get complex, reach out for help. Come and speak to your priest for guidance. Always remember that we were once our child's age, but we were never their age during these times.

Think of Christ who did not reject the Samaritan woman at the well. Rather he came close and had an intimate conversation with her, even asking her to draw water from the well that he might drink. Knowing that she was an outcast among her peers, he doesn't judge her, but rather engages her in conversation, looking into her eyes, listening as she spoke. In the end, our Lord brings the Samaritan woman to salvation, and with her, the entire city. By utilizing the parenting skills we have discussed, Jesus empowers the Samaritan woman whom we know as St. Photini, to reach her potential.

It is with these words that I challenge all of us to accept with great joy this tremendous responsibility that has been set before us. Remember that we are all parents in one way or another. Never forget that kids have to experience for themselves both the joy and the frustration of this life. They need to know what it feels like to burn their finger on a hot stove, and what it feels like to have their heart broken. It is not your responsibility to protect your children from all hurt in life. It is your responsibility to help them to get up, dust themselves off and to learn from their mistakes.



May our heavenly Father bless each and every one of us and guide us to do all these things, so that together with our children we may praise His holy name. Amen.






Prosforo Bread The Seal

In preparing the Prosforo Bread, a special seal is stamped on top of the bread before it is baked. The priest will know where you can borrow or purchase such a seal.

The middle part of the seal contains a square piece of bread with the words IC, XC, NIKA. This is a Greek abbreviation for JESUS CHRIST CONQUERS. Since this is the piece that will be changed into the Body of Christ, it is called the Lamb of God.

A large triangular piece is removed from the left of the Lamb of God and placed on the paten. This represents the Virgin Mary, our Lord's mother. Then nine smaller triangular pieces are removed from the seal to commemorate the angels, prophets, apostles and



saints of the Church. These are placed on the paten to the right of the Lamb of God. Following this, the priest prays for the living members of the congregation especially for those whose names have been submitted to him. As he prays for each name he cuts a small piece of bread, representing the person prayed for, and places it immediately below Jesus, the Lamb of God. Finally, he removes a piece of bread for each deceased person for whom we have requested prayers. Thus, around the Lamb of God on the paten is gathered the entire Church consisting of the angels, saints, and loved ones in heaven together with members of the local congregation. ALL are alive in God's presence and all constitute the one living Body of Christ. (You may purchase a seal in the St. Haralambos Bookstore)

Preparing Prosforo Bread for The Divine Liturgy

PROSFORO BREAD

- Ingredients: 6 cups flour (sifted)
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups warm water (110 degrees)
- 2 cakes or packs of yeast
- 1 Prosforo seal for imprinting seal of bread



This is the recipe for the preparation of Prosforo bread, which is then to be brought to the Church for offering in the Divine Liturgy.

Dissolve the yeast in warm water. Add salt and flour and knead until smooth. Place in the bowl, cover, and let rise. When it doubles in size, knead again. Then divide dough in half and put in cake pans that have been floured only (no grease). Dip seal in flour and stamp bread firmly to leave a clean imprint. Use a toothpick to place a few small holes around the edge of the seal. Let rise again about 1 hour. Bake for about 30 minutes at 350 degrees or until light brown. Prepare a list of names of Orthodox Christians who you would like commemorated in the service. Use first names only. On the left side, write "Living" at the top and list the names below. On the right side, write "Departed" and write the names of departed below. Bring the list and the bread to the Church before the start of Orthros (or the day before).

(Note: It is traditional to have an icon and a lighted candle in the area where the Prosforo is being prepared, as it is an offering of faith. The Jesus Prayer may be used during the preparation.)



ORTHODOX TEACHINGS ABOUT SACRED RELICS

Relics (in Greek: LEIPSANA), are the bodily "remains," the material remains of a saint after his or her death. Relics may also be any sacred object or article of clothing that may have had contact with the saint's body. The relics in our sacred shrine are slivers from the bones of the saints.

From the earliest of times, sacred relics of saints have been objects of reverence and honor. The theological foundation for relics is found in sacred scriptures and in holy tradition. The reverence, respect and honor expressed to the bodies of saints are grounded on the teaching that the body is the temple of the Holy Spirit. St. Paul writes: "Don't you know that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit who lives in you and who was given to you by God?" (I Corinthians 6:19) Scriptural examples are found in the miracles worked through the mantel of Elijah (2 Kings 2:14), through the bones of the Prophet Elisha (2 Kings 13:21), through the handkerchiefs that had contact with St. Paul's body [Acts 5:14-15) and even by the shadow of St. Peter as he passed by the sick [Acts 5:14-15]. The most treasured relic of the Church is the true cross upon which our Lord and God and Savior Jesus Christ was crucified on Golgatha and which was discovered by Saint Helen in the fourth century.

Saint Cyril of Jerusalem (4th century) writes: "Though the soul is not present, a power (the Holy Spirit) resides in the bodies of the saints because the righteous soul has for so many years dwelt in it or used it as its minister." [Catechetical Lectures XVIII, 16].

In the Orthodox Church we praise, glorify, honor and worship Almighty God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. We also reverence, venerate, respect and honor saints as heroes of our faith and as reflections of the image of Christ. Our worship and prayers are directed to the All Holy Trinity first and foremost. We also petition the intercessions of the Most Holy Mother of God and Ever Virgin Mary, the power of the Life-giving Holy Cross, the protection of the holy, heavenly, bodiless powers, the supplications of the glorious forerunner John the Baptist and the prayers of all the apostles, martyrs and saints.

Redeemed, cleansed, sanctified by the blood of Jesus and consecrated by the Holy Spirit we believe that the saints are drenched to their very bones with divinity and for this reason we reverence and venerate their sacred relics and petition their prayers.

Bishop Kallistos Ware reminds us that the veneration of the relics of Saints in the Orthodox Church proceeds from a highly developed theology of the body:

"Belief in the deification of the body and it its eventual resurrection helps to explain the Orthodox veneration of relics. Since the body is redeemed and sanctified along with the soul, and since the body will rise again, it is only fitting that Christians should show respect for the bodily remains of the saints. Reverence for relics is not the fruit of ignorance and superstition, but springs from a highly developed theology of the body."

THE SAINT DEMETRIOS RELIQUARY SHRINE

The Reliquary rests in the sacred bier located in the left front alcove of our Church nave.

AHEPA commissioned the painting of the icon depicting the fifteen men and women whose relics are in our Sacred Reliquary with the addition of Saint Kyrikos the Child Martyr and Saint Bonafatios, the Martyr whose relics are resting in the Holy Altar Table of our Church together with the relics of Saint Panteleimon, the Great Martyr.

HISTORY OF THE RELIQUARY SHRINE

After the death of Ignatius Koutroulelis, for many years the Chanter at Sts. Constantine & Helen Church in Reading, PA, his wife gave Gust Kraras two reliquaries with the request that one be given to Sts. Constantine & Helen Church in Reading, PA and the other be given to Fr. Christ Efstathiou, who was then Pastor of St. Demetrios Church in Wildwood. Both were delivered circa 1973. Although the relics were a sacred gift to Fr. Efstathiou, they remained in our Church following his passing and aid us in recalling his sacred ministry.



GIVING THANKS






