FR. MICHAEL L. PASTRIKOS

I hope this newsletter finds you and your family in good health, and that your homes are filled with the Lord's great blessings. We all should realize that the Summer Months are slowly coming to an end and that we are in the fall season. Days will get shorter and the nights longer. There will be more darkness than light. But you and I know that Christ is the light of the world and therefore we are not afraid of the darkness because the Lord will always be on our side, when we truly ask for Him to help us and bless us. One local Orthodox Priest in his sermon said; "In the first centuries of Christianity, in times of persecution, the faithful prayed in the catacombs, hidden in the damp underground. Faithful Christians came to these catacombs to offer prayers despite the darkness, dampness, and frightful cold, away from their persecutors. If we are going to share and to bask in that light, we need to pay more attention to our spiritual lives."

Today in our Churches, we have the right to pray and to exercise our religious freedom. ## **Apostle and Evangelist Luke**

### October 18



The Holy Apostle and Evangelist Luke was a native of Aniioch of ancient Syria, a companion of the Holy Apostle Paul ( see Phil.I :24, 2 Tim. 4: 10-11), and a physician enlightened in the Greek medical arts. Hearing about Christ, Luke arrived in Palestine and fervently accepted the preaching of salvation from the Lord Himself As one of the Seventy Apostles, Saint Luke was sent by the Lord with the others to preach the Kingdom of Heaven during the Savior's earthly life (Luke 10:1-3). After the Resurrection, the Lord Jesus Christ appeared to Saints Luke and Cleopas on the road to Emmaus. Luke accompanied Saint Paul on his second missionary journey, and from that time they were inseparable. When Paul's coworkers had forsaken him, only Luke remained to assist him in his ministry (2 Tim. 4:10-11). After the martyr's death of the FirstRanked Apostles Peter and Paul, Saint Luke left Rome to preach in Achaia, Libya,

Egypt and the Thebaid. He ended his life by suffering martyrdom in the city of Thebes.

Tradition credits Saint Luke with painting the first icons of the Mother of God. "Let the grace of Him Who was born of Me and My mercy be with these Icons," said the All-Pure Virgin after seeing the icons. Saint Luke also painted icons of the First-Ranked Apostles Peter and Paul. Saint Luke's Gospel was v'.litten in the years 62-63 A.O. at Rome, under the guidance of the Apostle Paul. 1n the preliminary verses (1: 1-3), Saint Luke precisely sets forth the purpose of his work. He proposes to record, in chronological order, everything known by Christians about Jesus Christ and His teachings. By doing this, he provided a firmer historical basis for Christian teaching (1:4). He carefully investigated the facts, and made generous use of the oral tradition of the Church and of what the Virgin Mary Herself had told him (2:19, 51).

1n Saint Luke's Gospel, the message of the salvation made possible by the Lord Jesus Christ, and the preaching of the Gospel, are of primary importance. Saint Luke also wrote the Acts of the Holy Apostles at Rome around 62-63 A.O. The Book of Acts, which is a continuation of the four Gospels, speaks about the works and the fruits of the holy Apostles after the Ascension of the Savior. At the center of the narrative is the Council of the holy Apostles at Jerusalem in the year 51 A.O., a Church event of great significance, which resulted in the separation of Christianity from Judaism and its independent dissemination into the

world (Acts 15:6-29). The theological focus of the Book of Acts is the coming of the Holy Spirit, \'ho guides the Church "into all truth" (John 16: 13) until the Second Coming of Christ.

The holy relics of Saint Luke were taken from Constantinople and brought to Padua, Italy at some point in history. Perhaps this was during the infamous Crusade of 1204..ln 1992, Metropolitan Hieronymus (Jerome) of Thebes, Greece requested the Roman Catholic bishop in Thebes to obtain a portion of Saint Luke's relics for the saint's empty sepulchre in the Orthodox cathedral in Thebes. The Roman Catholic bishop Antonio Martiazzo of Padua, noting that Orthodox pilgrims came to Padua to venerate the relics while many Catholics did not even know that the relics were there, appointed a committee to investigate the relics in Padua, and the skull of Saint Luke in the Catholic Cathedral of Saint Vico in Prague. The skeleton was determined to be that of an elderly man of strong build. In 2001, a tooth found in the coffin was judged to be consistent with the DNA of Syrians living near the area of Antioch dating from 72 AD. The skull in Prague perfectly fit the neck bone of the skeleton. The tooth found in the coffin in Padua was also found to fit the jawbone of the skull. Bishop Mattiazzo sent a rib from the relics to Metropolitan Hieronymus to be venerated in Saint Luke's original tomb in the Orthodox cathedral at Thebes. Saint Luke is also commemorated on April 22.

# St. Demetrios Our Patron Saint

### DEMETRIOS THE MYRRH-STREAMER & GREAT MARTYR OF THESSALONIKI

Saint Demetrius was a Thessalonian, a most pious son of pious and noble parents, and a teacher of the Faith of Christ. When Maximian first came to Thessalonica in 290, he raised the Saint to the rank of Duke of Thessalv. But when it was discovered that the Saint was a Christian, he was arrested and kept bound in a bath-house. While the games were under way in the city, Maximian was a spectator there. A certain friend of his, a barbarian who was a notable wrestler, Lyaeus by name, waxing haughty because of the height and strength of his body, boasted in the stadium and challenged the citizens to a contest with him. All that fought with him were defeated. Seeing this, a certain youth named Nestor, aquaintance of Demetrius', came to the Saint in the bath-house and asked his blessing to fight Lyaeus single-handed. Receiving this blessing and sealing himself with the sign of the precious Cross, he presented himself in the stadium, and said, "O God of Demetrius, help me!" and straightway he engaged Lyaeus in combat and smote him with a mortal blow to the heart, leaving the former boaster

lifeless upon the earth. Maximian was sorely grieved over this, and when he learned who was the cause of this defeat, he commanded straightway and Demetrius was pierced with lances while he was yet in the bath-house, As for Nestor, Maximian commanded that he be slain with his own sword.

#### WHAT IS ELDER FINANCIAL ABUSE— AND HOW DO WE PREVENT IT?

#### HOW TO RECOVER FROM ELDER FINANCIAL ABUSE

Recovering from financial exploitation can be a long and tedious journey. It's often treated as a civil matter, which means there will be no criminal charges against the abuser.

State laws for elder financial abuse vary. Schoen says some states, like California, have comprehensive guidelines for recovery—while some do not. Refer to this NCEA state resources page to read more about your state's laws.

The penalty is often returning the stolen assets or money, and any interest or earnings accrued while the assets were stolen. This process often doesn't require going to court unless the abuser refuses to return the stolen assets.

If the situation is more complex, such as the victim sending large sums of money to a scammer, it can be harder to recover. First, file a report with the FTC at ReportFraud.ftc.gov. The next steps depend on how the money was sent; if you sent it via debit or credit card, for example, you should call the bank and report the fraud immediately and ask them to reverse the transfer.

Recovering emotionally from financial abuse can be a long journey. It's common to experience feelings of shame, embarrassment or humiliation after realizing you're a victim of abuse. Consider finding a support group via your community's senior center or local Area Agency on Aging to help you process and heal from the experience.





### 60th Ordination Anniversary of Father Steven Vlahos held Sunday, September 15

Chrysi Vlahos has announced that the Sixtieth anniversary of the ordination to the sacred priesthood of her spouse, Father Steven J. Vlahos will be held on Sunday, September 15th at the Saint Demetrios Church in North Wildwood, NJ. Worship services conducted by the pastor, Father Michael Pastrikos will begin at 9:00 AM. Following the ritual of the Elevation of the Holy and Lifesaving Cross, a reception will be held in the Community Center.

All faithful in the Philadelphia region are invited to attend and to extend greetings and well wishes to the celebrant priest.

The sixty year pastoral milestone included services to the Annunciation Church in Little Rock Arkansas where the priest also pursued studies in dogmatic theology at Saint John Catholic seminary and later taught Church History. His pastoral ministry was followed by service in Rockford, Illinois, Bethesda, Maryland and Cherry Hill NJ.

In addition to priestly services, Father Vlahos was the Special Deputy Surrogate of Camden County New Jersey and Advisor to the Orthodox Christian Laity movement seeking reform and church and renewal. In his government position, Father Vlahos supervised a program providing free wills, living wills and powers of attorney to thousands of elderly citizens.

At the Archdiocese Centennial in 2022, His Eminence Archbishop Elpidophoros specially recognized Father Vlahos for "Faith and Righteousness in his long service to the Church."

Attached with this announcement, please find a short biography of this beloved Saint, who we now proudly proclaim as the Patron Saint of our sacred Metropolis.

I also have the great pleasure to announce that the first celebrations for St. Iakovos of Evia as the new Patron Saint of our Metropolis will take place with Great Hierarchical Vespers on Thursday, November 21, 2024, at 6:00pm and the Orthros and Hierarchical Divine Liturgy on November 22, 2024, at 9:00am. The Divine Services will be held in the Chapel of our Metropolis Headquarters in Westfield, New Jersey.


Please share this announcement and biography of St. Iakovos of Evia with all of your beloved parishioners, so that together as one family we may rejoice and celebrate in this blessed news of our new Patron Saint.

Praying that our loving Lord, through the intercessions of St. Iakovos of Evia, continues to bless all of you and all the devoted parishioners of our Metropolis with every good and perfect gift from above, I remain,

St. Iakovos of Evia was born on 5 November 1920 to pious parents in Asia Minor. Soon after he departed for Greece as a refugee, near Corinth.

By the age of seven he had memorized the entire Divine Liturgy although he was illiterate. In 1927 he went to elementary school and was distinguished for his performance. Everyone knew of his love for the Church. That same year Saint Paraskevi appeared to him and revealed his brilliant ecclesiastical future. In the coming years he would have many visions of various Saints. At this time, he was in continuous prayer and even reportedly healed people in his village.

'From 1938 till the end of his life he lived in extreme asceticism, eating little, praying always, and working hard. He lost his mother in 1942 and was drafted into the army in 1947. Upon his return from the army in 1949 his father passed away, leaving him to care for his sister, Anastasia until her marriage in 1952.

At the age of 32 Iakovos became a novice monk at the Monastery of St. David in Evia and on December 19, 1952, he was ordained a priest by Metropolitan Gregory of Halkida. On June 25, 1975, he became Abbot of the Monastery. This monastery was quite dilapidated on his arrival and Father Iakovos lived in great poverty which affected his health. It was reported that he conversed personally with the saints including St. Paraskevi, St. John the Russian, and St. David of Evia, the patron saint of the monastery. The Elder did not live for himself but from the fruit of his prayer and fasting he gave counsel and help to the people who began flocking to him. Despite many illnesses he always made time for the faithful who came to the monastery.

Beginning in 1990 his health began to decline and on November 21, 1991, he attended the Divine Liturgy, received Holy Communion, and heard the confessions of several people. He died peacefully later that day with thousands of people attending his funeral with many shouting "A saint! A saint!" The Monastery of St. David has recorded over 300 testimonies of miraculous help connected with the prayers of the Elder Iakovos.

On November 17, 2017, the Holy and Sacred Synod of the Ecumenical Patriarchate canonized St. Iakovos of Evia, officially numbering him among the saints to be commemorated on November 22nd.


- 1. The cost for the 2024 Delaware Valley Ambassador Awards Banquet is \$105 per person.

#### VOLUNTEERISM: OUR OBLIGATION

In April our nation celebrated National Volunteer Week to honor and show appreciation to the thousands of volunteers who willingly give their time and know-how for the benefit of others; thus illuminating the American spirit!

Throughout the history of our beloved St. Demetrios Church, we enjoyed the efforts of many volunteers beginning prior to the groundbreaking of our edifice. In fact, this is true in all parishes because the founders were inspired to work in unison in order to see the vision for their community come to fruition: to plant the seed of Christianity, in our case, Orthodoxy, in the far reaches of the world. And thus, our St. Demetrios Greek Orthodox Church was established in North Wildwood New Jersey! The author feels that this is an appropriate time to reignite our spirit of volunteerism.

For the Greeks of the Diaspora, it was vitally important for them to transplant the roots of their faith wherever their fate took them whether it was Asia Minor, Australia, Canada, Europe, North or South America, etc. They were successful in realizing their mission spreading the Word of God by building churches and church schools in their new homelands against all odds, enduring hardships, and with limited economic resources because their faith NEVER wavered. Unlike the Orthodox Church of Greece, our parishes have been established and maintained by the efforts and donations of devout volunteers — without government support. Let us ask ourselves, "If our forefathers could accomplish so much as strangers in new lands, how high will we set our goals to perpetuate and expand their vision of glorifying God and spreading His Word?" Do we not owe it to their memory to do so?

We are fortunate at St. Demetrios to have dedicated volunteers serving its various ministries without reservation; they are responsible for the very existence of our church community. These individuals continue their service and by example involve their children in service to our church, for they find fulfillment in glorifying and thanking God by using the talents which He has bestowed upon them. They know that giving is much more rewarding than receiving! They forego the notion of earning extra money at a job and give their time/ funds to their church. In so doing, as Christians they are practicing the values of our Judeo-Christian faith: loving and helping our neighbors, thus coming

closer to Christ. It is amazing how some persons who are full time employees and heads of households still find time to be very active volunteers; giving credence to the saying, "Ask a busy person to complete a task and it will get done!"

Once again it was rewarding to see our young people members of the Greek and Sunday Schools, alongside their parents pleasantly interacting as they prepared the Crosses of palms for Palm Sunday. This tradition as well as others can only be continued by the efforts of caring parents and adults, who although have other family obligations give priority to their children's involvement in the church.

As we welcome the month of October, our St. Demetrios offers us a host of opportunities for which to volunteer. You need only to let us know when and how you are able to assist. The annual celebration of the Name Day of our church is approaching when your help will be needed for the planned activities. You will find fellowship with other volunteers to be quite rewarding. As a member of the parish you may not be able to volunteer your time but you can answer the call for donating toward the maintenance projects of our church building. A list of the proposed projects has been listed in recent issues of the Koinonia. Please step forward and commit to helping with one of these projects. Rest assured that your time, efforts, and monetary donations in these endeavors are greatly valued.

We foresee more active participation in the events of our community and new traditions being initiated by our energetic and innovative Father Michael! We commit ourselves to their accomplishments. Let us know that YOU, too, will be a vital part of our team!

We have been made aware through the teachings of our church of all that Jesus. Christ our Savior has voluntarily done for each of us; so now we must answer, "What can I do for Jesus through our church?"

#### THE STEWARDSHIP OF ST. JOHN KOUKOUZELIS – OCTOBER 1

Christian Orthodox Stewardship is a practice that is often misunderstood and misused in the Church. Many think of Stewardship solely from a monetary perspective, as a means to financially support the sacred work of the Church. This is, of course, important, but Stewardship should not be limited to this - it is much more!

Christian Orthodox stewards are taught to give their Time, Talents, and Treasure to the glory of God. There are many opportunities in parish life that enable us to support the Lord's work. It is a sacred privilege for each of us to participate in the life of the Church. We pledge ourselves to the Lord so that our offerings may be faithful and obedient to His teachings and the Sacred Traditions of our Christian Orthodox Faith.



Among the many ways we can participate in our parish ministries is as a chanter, a reader, or member of the choir. We emulate the angelic choirs in heaven when we sing to the glory of God. There are also a number of saints whose example we follow by managing our Time and using our musical Talent to sing to the Lord. Among them are: St. Romanos the Melodist, St. John of Damascus, St. Andrew of Crete, Joseph the Hymnographer, and St. Kassiane. There is also another saint who is known for his love for the music of our Church, a pious man who possessed a marvelous voice, and a steward of the Faith who gave his Time and Talent to the glory of God. Who was this person? St. John Koukouzelis!


As a young man, St. John Koukouzelis was recognized for his musical talent. He was sent to the Conservatory of Music in Constantinople, where he became a popular singer for the Imperial Court. The success he enjoyed as an entertainer for the Emperor and his court should have given him every satisfaction, but John was not content with his life. He was concerned about the flattery and praise brought upon him for his musical talent and felt that his voice was not being used for its real purpose. John knew that the Emperor would never allow him to leave his position, so he fled to the Holy Mountain to search his soul and to pray to God for guidance. The Emperor became concerned about the disappearance of his favorite singer and offered a reward to anyone who could give him information about him.

At the Great Lavra Monastery, John did not reveal who he was or what position he had held in the Imperial Court. He simply wanted to be a shepherd and monk. While taking care of the flock, John would sing hymns to the Lord and to the Theotokos. One day, a couple of monks heard him singing with a voice so sweet and melodic that they thought that it was that of an angel. They moved quietly, hoping to see the vision of an angel but instead they saw John with his flock. The monks rushed back to the monastery and told the abbot what they had heard and seen. When John returned, he was summoned by the abbot who asked him why he was not willing to use his voice during the divine services. John explained his story to him, but the abbot assured him that the Emperor would understand and accept his desire to pursue the monastic life. The abbot instructed him to never hide the Talent that God had given him, but to use it to praise and glorify the His Almighty Name. From that moment on, John served as the lead chanter in the monastery. As the Akathist Hymn was being sung during Great Lent one year, John was exhausted and sat down and fell asleep near the icon of the Holy Mother of God and soon fell asleep. The Theotokos appeared to him and said: "Greetings, John! Sing, and don't stop singing; and for this, I will never leave you." She then placed a gold coin into his hand and disappeared. John woke up immediately, and in his hand was the gold coin.

The life of St. John Koukouzelis is an example of how important it is to manage our Time so that we may use our Talents properly. We have all been entrusted with blessings from God, and He desires that we put them to good use. Take a moment from your busy schedule and ask yourself: "Am I managing God's blessings as a good and faithful steward?" May St. John Koukouzelis intercede on your behalf and be an inspiration so that you use your Talents for the glory of God.

## stewardship news



The whole issue of Stewardship is as old as the Bible. Cain and Abel made an offering to God. The gift of Abel was accepted while the gift of Cain was rejected, Why? Because Cain made an ordinary offering while Abel brought the very best he could to God. Therefore, we must remember that our gifts will not find favor in God's eyes unless they come from the heart and out of sense of love. All successful Communities function when each of us in one way or another contribute our time, talents, and love. You commit yourselves to a cause that you believe in with God's blessings. Through a Christian Stewardship pledge system- each parishioner now decides through the process of prayer and consideration what they personally feel they must return to God. If you give your life to Christ, then giving will be a joy to you, not a duty. If you have not given your life to Christ, giving will always be painful. A mother who loves her child counts it a joy not a chore to stay up all night with that child when it is ill and needy. Through the generous and selfless giving, she is rewarded by her child's unconditional love. As we read Scripture we come to see that God always gives abundantly. He multiplied the 5 loaves, which fed 5,000 people. He blessed the water at the marriage feast in Cana and there was an overabundance of wine to be shared by all the invited guests. In 36 hours after someone has given blood for someone else, God will replenish that blood. God always gives to us, but what do we give back to God. Our leftovers?

When we attend the Divine Liturgy on Sunday's, we don't want a fragmented piece of sanctifying grace- we want the fullness of Christ's grace and blessings. When we stood before the altar on our wedding day, you didn't want the priest to give you just a part of the Sacrament of Marriage. When you brought your child to be baptized-you had every right to expect that he or she was fully baptized in the Holy Trinity. Not partially? If we receive the fullness of Christ's grace- then why should what we return to the Lord and His Church be any less in fullness and quality? Why should our Christian giving and our Stewardship be anything less than what we have to offer to God in return for His many blessings and material gifts? If you ever had a chance to visit the children in a hospital who are suffering from different ailments, there is where we can experience life's tragedies. This would truly give us the true example of what God's gift to us really is.

In closing, the faithful of our community today we are asked to make a financial commitment to the Lord's work through our church. Our offering is our active prayer of thanksgiving. Support of the Church is a vital part of Christian worship and charity. There are a good number of faithful here in our parish, who can double or triple their gifts without in any way reducing their standard of living. Giving is a personal matter between you and God. Remember the example of Cain and Abel. How much should I give? Give no more- no less - give only as God has prospered you. Do not give what you have been giving in the past. Consider how much God has blessed you with. Let us contemplate all the things our Church does for us. So if we give an honest portion back to God He will multiply it a hundred fold. #### PREVENTING MOST STROKES: KEY LIFESTYLE STRATEGIES YOU NEED TO KNOW

Strokes—abrupt interruptions of blood flow to the brain—represent not just a medical condition but a pivotal life event, often with profound consequences. Their prevention, therefore, is not merely a matter of health advice but a commitment to a life well-lived, preserving cognitive and physical function.

#### 1. NUTRITIONAL WISDOM: BEYOND DIET FADS

Nutrition plays a crucial role in stroke prevention, transcending the simplicity of "eat this, not that." It's about understanding the impacts of different nutrients on vascular health.

A diet rich in plant-based foods-fruits, vegetables, grains, and lean proteins contributes to lower blood pressure and cholesterol levels, both risk factors-for stroke.

Saturated fats and trans fats. commonly found in processed foods, increase the risk of stroke and should be minimized.

The Mediterranean diet. characterized by its high content of olive oil, fish, and fresh produce, has been repeatedly linked with reduced

also understanding their collective synergy in supporting vascular health.

#### 2. PHYSICAL ACTIVITY: THE CIRCULATORY CATALYST

Regular physical activity is a cornerstone in preventing strokes. Exercise aids in managing weight, reducing hypertension, and improving lipid profiles, all of which are stroke risk factors.

The American Heart Association and other health agencies recommend at least 150 minutes of moderateintensity aerobic activity per week, or 75 minutes of vigorous activity.

This does not necessarily mean prolonged gym sessions. Brisk walking, cycling, or swimming can be equally effective. The key lies in consistency and integration of physical activity into daily routines, making it a sustainable and enjoyable part of life.

#### 3. TOBACCO AND ALCOHOL: UNDERSTANDING AND OVERCOMING DEPENDENCIES

Smoking and excessive alcohol consumption are major risk factors for stroke. Smoking nearly doubles the risk by damaging blood vessels, increasing clot formation, and reducing oxygen in the blood.

Quitting smoking is arguably one of the most significant steps one can take to reduce stroke risk.

Alcohol, meanwhile, should be consumed in moderation. Heavy drinking escalates blood pressure and can lead to irregular heart rhythms, both of which increase stroke risk.

Understanding personal triggers and seeking support for cessation or moderation is crucial in this journey.

#### 4. STRESS MANAGEMENT: THE HIDDEN CULPRIT

The link between stress and stroke is undeniable. Chronic stress can lead to hypertension, a significant stroke risk factor.

> Effective relaxation and stress management techniques, such as mindfulness, meditation, art therapy, regular exercise, and adequate sleep, play a vital role in mitigating this risk. Developing resilience against stress is not just about relaxation but also about cultivating a mindset and lifestyle that can withstand life's pressures and uncertainties.

#### 5. REGULAR HEALTH SCREENINGS: EARLY DETECTION AND MANAGEMENT

Regular health check-ups are essential in identifying and managing

stroke risk. It's not just about selecting the right foods, but risk factors like hypertension, diabetes, and high cholesterol - all of which are silent contributors to stroke risk.

> Early detection and management of these conditions through lifestyle changes and medication (when necessary) can significantly reduce the risk of stroke. It's about creating a proactive rather than reactive approach to health.

#### 6. SLEEP HYGIENE: THE UNDERAPPRECIATED FACTOR

Sleep quality and duration have a significant impact on stroke risk. Sleep disorders, such as sleep apnea and insomnia, are linked to an increased risk of stroke. Ensuring adequate and quality sleep is vital.

This involves establishing a regular sleep schedule, creating a restful environment, and addressing any sleep-related issues with a healthcare professional.

Preventing most strokes is an achievable goal through informed, consistent lifestyle choices. These six strategies offer a roadmap towards maintaining brain health, emphasizing that stroke prevention is not an isolated medical objective but an integral part of a holistic approach to wellness and longevity.



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



### The easy way

#### Have you ever taken a test? Some-

times you might have some hard questions to answer. Some of them might be kind of easy. And on a test, sometimes the hard ones and the easy ones might be all mixed up together.

The gospel reading today tells us about the hard things and the easy thing we must do if we want to be good followers of Christ. The gospel says, "If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them...But love your enemies, do good, and lend,



hoping for nothing in return; and your reward will be great, and you will be sons of the Most High."

So the easy thing is to love people who love us! The easy thing is to do good to those who do good to us. The easy thing is to give to people who give things back to us. That's the easy thing. We can do that!

The hard thing is to love our enemies, to do good to people who are mean to us, to give to people who might not give us anything back. God wants us to do the easy things, of course. (You're nice to your friends, aren't you?) But God wants us to do the hard things, too. God wants us to be nice to our enemies and to people who aren't so nice to us. You can show you are a Christian by doing the hard things, too!

much school, and he had never really learned how to sing. Plus, he had a bad voice. People laughed at him, and made fun of him-even some of the other priests and deacons did!


